Two Years For Theft of Junk

**Sentence Meted out To Charles
Dwyer by Judge McLatchy—
Two Civil Cases Settled**

The July session of Northumber-
land County Court was held here
last week before Judge McLatchy.
In the case of King vs. Charles
Dwyer charged with having taken
and sold junk belonging to the Dom-
inion Pulp Company. The accused
pleaded guilty but claimed he had
found the stuff. He was sentenced
to two years in Dorchester peniten-
tiary.

The case of Robichaud versus
Nowlan was withdrawn by Mr.
Whalen, the chief witness not being
present at 11 o'clock.

The civil docket was as follows:
Archibald Alcorn, of Blackville
vs. Charles Mitchell, of Doaktown,
suit for damage to auto from collision
with team.

Alcorn vs. Mitchell was first taken
up.

The witnesses examined were D.
G. Schofield, Harold Connors, A.
Alcorn and Charles McLaughlin for
plaintiff and Messrs. Chester Mit-
chell, L. B. Amos and Charles Mit-
chell and Walter Freeze for defence.

The jury returned a verdict for
defendant.

The case Milton Amos versus
Charles Mitchell was de-
cided for the plaintiff
with a verdict of \$131 with about \$60
costs. Mitchell had bought at the
sheriff's sale logs seized by William
Bamford on execution against
Charles Amos, father of the plaintiff.
The plaintiff claimed the logs as his
and hence the suit. This case has
been in the courts three years. It is
reported that the decision will be
appealed.

Roads and Flour Discussed by T. I. L.

At the regular meeting of the
Town Improvement League held
last Tuesday evening, Mr. J. E.
Ander presided and there were eight
other members present.

The Secretary reported that E. A.
McCurdy as delegate of the League
had asked the Town Council at its
last session to take steps to improve
the two main streets of the town
which were also County thorough-
fares and to ask the provincial gov-
ernment for assistance therefor. The
League's request had been referred
to the Public Works Committee
with instructions to do everything
possible in the matter.

This was followed by a general
discussion of roads and road making
in which all present took part.

Ald. Stuart brought up the ques-
tion of the retail prices of flour be-
ing greatly increased to consumers
who, by the regulations of the Food
Board, have to buy in much smaller
quantities than formerly.

Ald. Stuart contended that the
Government should fix a maximum
price and minimum wages on an ab-
solutely fair basis, for all commodities
and in all industries.

The subject was also discussed by
Revs. L. H. MacLean, P. W. Dixon
and Mr. T. A. Clarke.

Everett O'Donnell of Ladlow while
motoring from Millerton to Frederic-
ton on Monday night met with a
serious mishap near Ladlow. His
automobile was overturned on the
highway and the owner and Pte.
Appley who was with him were
pinned beneath it. The two were
forced to remain in that plight for
some time until a farmer with a team
drove by and went to their rescue.
Mr. McDonald had one of his arms
broken in two places and a hole torn
completely through the flesh. His
injuries were serious and he was
brought to Newcastle and placed in
the Miramichi Hospital. Pte. Appley
who had been wounded in the
chest in France complained that his
wound gave him pain after the ac-
cident. Otherwise he escaped unin-
jured.

Eel River Lady Killed By Lightning

Tuesday's heavy storm took toll
of life at Eel River Bridge near Pt.
Sapin, the terrible tragedy occurring
in the home of Alexander Jenkins of
that place, and bereaving him of
his wife.

Mrs. Jenkins was sitting in the
kitchen at the time of the storm
with a child on her knee and it is
presumed that during the heaviest
crash, a bolt ran down the chimney
into the room, striking Mrs. Jenkins
dead on the spot. The most mar-
velous feature of the sad event was
that the child in Mrs. Jenkins's arms
was absolutely unharmed while she
was stricken dead.

The late Mrs. Jenkins was 52 years
of age and is survived by her hus-
band and four children.

Canadian convalescent home.
