PREMIER MEIGHEN

The youngest Prime Minister in
the British Empire, Rt. Hon. Arthur
Meighen is the first citizen of Can-
ada by the Divine right of intellect.
Described by Sir Wilfrid Laurier
more than ten years ago as "the
brightest mind that Canadian Con-
servatism has produced," his public
record, since 1908, has been a pro-
cession of dazzling achievements.
Solicitor-General in 1913, Minister
of the Interior in 1917, Prime in 1920,
and acclaimed by the united press
of Britain as a great Imperial states-
man in 1921—all this within the age
of forty-seven—political history
embraces few, if any, more remark-
able careers.

Nor is it that he has been the
spoonfed child of fortune. For
Arthur Meighen, like his great British
contemporary, Lloyd George, is
sprung from the soil, a true son of
the people. Born on a farm near
St. Mary's, in Ontario, he has toil-
ed with both hands and brain, has
fought his way to the summit of em-
inence by sheer intellect and pluck.

One wonders whence he derives the
strength and endurance which he
puts into his battles. For Mr. Mei-
ghen, again resembling Lloyd
George, is small in stature. He looks
frail and often seems to be weary.
He has the face of an ascetic, the
abstraction of a student. But as a
master of platform and parliamen-
tary eloquence, he stands without a
peer. Macaulay once said that Par-
liament was government by speaking.
Judged by that standard, as indeed,
by any other, Mr. Meighen is un-
rivalled in his day. With a platform
manner suggestive of passionless
austerity he commands a logic that
is merciless and wielded as well,
though very sparingly, a satire that
destroys. He is utterly fearless in
debate, and will never be charged
against him that he was willing to
wound, but afraid to strike. But
while a hard hitter, he is always
courteous and mindful of his high
position. He is not a rhetorician.
Cautious, analytical, practical, he
does not possess the oratory of ex-
hortation; never descends to the
role of a public entertainer; refuses
to adjective minor issues into a
Thermopylae and never puts imag-
ery before truth. Yet despite his
fidelity to logic and cold fact, he is
a master of beauty in expression.

was one of but very, very few that
did escape in that vicinity. Three
sons of that home became ministers
of the gospel.
