SPROTT TALENTED ACTOR

KING GEORGE

Bert Lytell, who has won a great name for himself everywhere with cinema audiences, will be seen at the King George Theatre on Monday and Tuesday in his latest Metro production, "Blind Man's Eyes." This story is based on the extensively read novel of William McKark and Edwin Balmer. It is a gripping, stirring romance with a strong melodramatic vein, and it gives the star the sort of role he achieved such success with when a stage star on Broadway. He first enacts the role of a man railroaded to jail on a trumped-up murder charge, brought by a crooked financier who had defrauded his mother of her estate. And some time later altered in facial appearance, the ex-convict reappears to wreak vengeance, only to find that the man he was alleged to have slain is alive and still carrying on his nefarious schemes. It is an ardent story of human passions, and shows the incalculable harm which can be caused by numerous people through malicious and criminal accusations, based on hate and envy. Hugh O'orton is a man of high standing in the community where he lives, but who loses everything dear to him when he is accused of a crime which he did not commit. How he determines to uncover the real criminal and bring him to justice is dramatically told in the play, which is cleverly interspersed with sympathetic comedy and glowing romance. Mr. Lytell is supported by a notable cast, which includes Naomi Childers, Joseph Kilgour, Frank Currier, Miss Joan Anderson, Richard Morris and Gertrude Clair.

WOMAN'S IMAGINATION

Woman's imagination is an expensive thing for photo-play producers. Story writers insist on using this fact for the development of plots and as woman's imagination is frequently elaborate, it costs a tidy sum to produce "fade ins." This was the case in Thomas H. Ince's latest picture "Happy Through Married," in which Enid Bennett is featured.
