POLICE COURT NEWS.

Bonaventure Here.

The s.s. Bonaventure, Capt. C. Cross, arrived at A. J. Harvey & Co. today at 11.30 with a cargo of anthracite coal from Philadelphia. The vessel had a good run down and had fine weather except for the last couple of days when thick fog and a stiff N.E. wind prevailed. The ship left here on May 19th last to engage in the fish trade, and ran south from New Orleans, Mobile and other ports to Costa Rica and Jamaica. One accident occurred on the ship, some weeks ago when one of the crew, named Carbery, was drowned, as exclusively reported in the Telegram. The ship will later be dry docked for an overhaul and repairs preparatory to getting ready for the seal fishery. The Bonaventure makes another trip south and will be back here by the middle of November.

Cable News.

PARIS, Nov. 2. The French Cabinet resigned to-day. Although the fact that there was a divergence of views among the ministers concerning legislative measures designed to prevent crises similar to that brought about by the recent railway strike, was well known, the resignation created a sensation, as it had been expected that Premier Briand would remain and remodel the Ministry in harmony with his views on parliamentary programme to meet future strike crises. The exact nature of Briand's programme has not been announced but it is understood that both Miller, Minister of Public Works, Posts and Telegraphs, and M. Viviani, Minister of Labor, dissented, particularly Miller, who insisted upon the principle of arbitration.

The July 23rd Premier Briand Ministry, which succeeded the Clemenceau Ministry on July 23rd, unexpectedly resigned to-day in consequence of the bitter attacks made in the Chamber of Deputies upon the Government's action in suppressing the recent railway strike and proposed legislation for the avoidance of a similar crisis in the future. A strong Republican majority in the Chamber voted confidence in the Government, but at a meeting of the Ministers, dissensions developed and Briand announced that new and serious problems had grown out of the labor troubles, that must be met by a united ministry. Accordingly he suggested the retirement of himself, and associates. It is believed that President Fallieres will ask Briand to form a new Cabinet and it is expected that he will remodel the retiring ministry in harmony with his views on a parliamentary programme to meet the crisis resulting from the strike. It is likely that Foreign Minister Pichon, Minister of Commerce, Deputy Minister of War, Brun and Minister of the Navy, Lapreyre, will remain in the new Cabinet. Miller, Minister of Public Works, Posts and Telegraphs, and M. Viviani, Minister of Labor, dissented from Briand's programme and their retirement is likely to be permanent. Miller especially was dissatisfied insisting that the principle of arbitration should be recognized more broadly by the Government. This afternoon President Fallieres asked Briand to form a new Cabinet and the latter accepted the task.

LONDON, Nov. 2. The Municipal elections throughout England and Wales show considerable growth in the Labor and Socialist parties. The women candidates fared badly.

PARIS, Nov. 2. Last night's rumor of a revolution in Spain and of which there was no subsequent confirmation at the Gaultois office appear to be a street riot at Barcelona in which several persons were killed or wounded. Nothing whatever in support of the rumor developed.

MONTIVIDEO, Nov. 2. The Revolutionary leaders have agreed to disperse and disarm, provided the candidacy of Jose B. O'Leary for the Presidency is withdrawn. The Government has increased the severity of censorship and has stopped the sale of Argentine newspapers.

Editor Evening Telegram.

MADRID, Nov. 2. The rumors of revolutionary outbreaks in Spain, particularly in Barcelona, are without foundation. Calm is reported throughout the country. The above despatch direct from Madrid disposes of the rumor given earlier last night of a revolutionary outbreak in Spain. A despatch from Paris to the London Daily Telegraph stated that a rebellious movement had begun in Madrid.

ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 2. Drachokoff, former head of the Russian Secret Police, died suddenly last night at Vitebsk. He was prominently identified with the investigation of Axel Heber of the fighting Russian Socialists, who was declared to be a Government spy, and M. Lomon, a former Director of Police in the Department of the Ministry of the Interior and with Father Capon at fair.

SAN SALVADOR, Nov. 2. It is reported here that the General Jose Valledares, ex-Governor of Amalapa, Honduras, who was deposed from office by President Davila, and recalled to Tegucigalpa, has returned to Amalapa in order to hand over his command to his successor, and openly declared himself against the Government. It is alleged that he has attacked the U. S. Consular Agent and committed other excesses.

GLOUCESTER, Mass. Nov. 2. The most dismal failure in the history of the industry is the general verdict of the Gloucester fishermen on the State Mackerel fishing for 1910 which is ending its season with two or three vessels yet to come into port. The total catch of salt mackerel for the season has only been 3,165 barrels, compared with 18,300 barrels in 1909 and 20,425 barrels in 1908, both of which were disappointing as compared with a total catch of 300,000 barrels landed within a period of 8 months a few years ago. This year the catch of fresh mackerel has been almost as much a disappointment as the small catch of the salted produce. The southern mackerel fishery was practically a complete failure, although the fish were taken off the Massachusetts coast.

The total of fresh mackerel landed this year was only 19,835 barrels against 46,423 in 1909 and 47,527 barrels the year before.

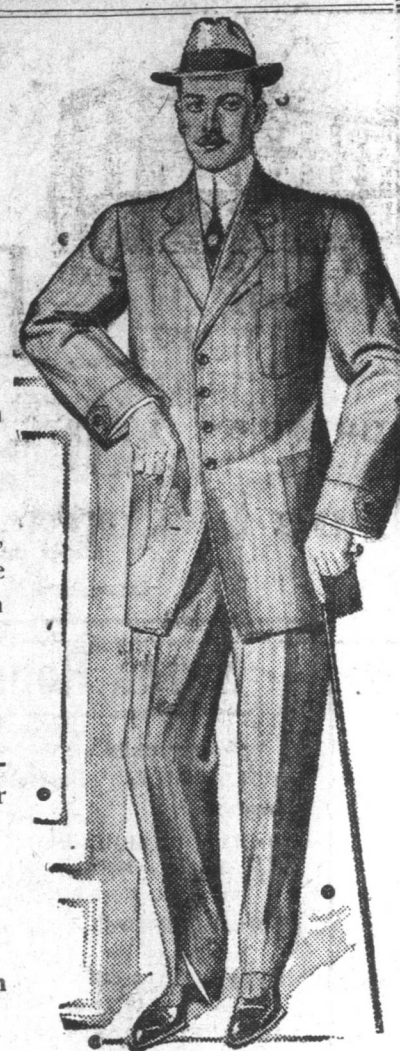
