**5000 Waiters Now on Strike.**

New York, June 2.—The International Hotel Workers' Union, which has embarrassed more than two score large hotels and restaurants by calling nearly 5,000 waiters and cooks out on strike during the past week, spent the day in reviewing its successes and added, it was declared hundreds of hotel workers to its membership. An executive meeting of the union was scheduled for the afternoon, but it was postponed until tomorrow because the rush of taking in new members is so great.

The officials said that letters by the hundreds were being received from waiters and chefs in nearby cities expressing desire to join the union and if need be, to strike. It is also announced that Coney Island waiters

had been organized and prepared to join the strike, but the association could not be verified.

The hotel managements had a quiet Sunday, because then oppressively hot weather in town sent thousands away to the cooler resorts, and with skeleton crews in kitchens and dining

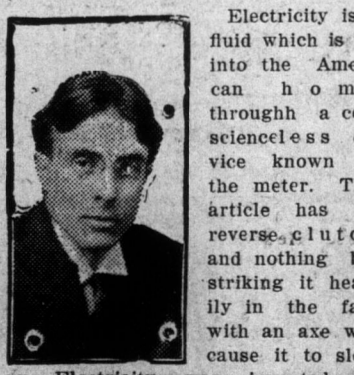

**Electricity.**

Electricity is a fluid which is fed into the American home through a concealed device known as the meter. This article has no reverse, plunch, and nothing but striking it heavily in the face with an axe will cause it to slow up. Electricity was invented by Thomas A. Edison, who was tinkering around one day and fell onto it with so much energy that he was cauterized in several places. When Mr. Edison came to, he cried "Eureka!" and immediately invented the electric

belt, which has forever stilled the voice of the cross-stitched lumbago and retired the mustard plaster to private life. Benjamin Franklin corralled a little loose electricity one day at the end of a kite string, but he was a wise man and let go just prior to being removed to the morgue for identification purposes. Electricity is bought by the kilowatt. This is a technical term not found in any of our dictionaries, and is injected into the conversation so that people will not faint when they see the monthly light bill. When a kilowatt becomes big enough to trip the meter in a house

which hasn't been occupied for three months it is called a watt. Electricity has become so common that people use it for everything except as a beverage.
