LONDON, Dec. 29.
Floods have done tremendous damage throughout England. At Portsmouth a wedding party had to be conveyed to church in boats. Old Lally Port landing stage, used by Nelson, was swept away. Telegraph and telephone lines in France are out of commission.

ARICHAH, N.S., Dec. 29.
A heavy storm last night of S.E. wind and a tidal wave, caused great destruction of property along the waterfront. Several families were compelled to seek shelter. William Jean's store, at Petit de Grat, was swept into the sea. The breakwater at Little Ance and West Arichah, under erection, was destroyed. No fatalities.

LONDON, Dec. 29.
The Peace envoys met again at St. James' Palace, on Saturday. After an hour and a half's discussion, it was decided to adjourn. The Balkan delegates gathered at 11 a.m. Rehad Pasha took the chair. The Turkish counter-proposals were first presented. The Turkish conditions were found impossible of acceptance, and no progress could be made. The Turkish envoys declaring that they must again communicate with Constantinople. They reassembled at 4 o'clock Monday afternoon.

LONDON, Dec. 29.
There is a possibility of Prince George, the King's second son, visiting American ports in the near future. It is announced that the Prince, after four years' tuition at the Naval College Osborne at Dartmouth, will embark on the armoured cruiser Cumberland with other naval cadets for a long cruise in the West Indies. This will be undertaken for the purpose of instruction. The Admiralty has decided that the Cumberland shall visit some foreign ports to enable the cadets to see something of the world.

INDIANAPOLIS, Dec. 29.
Thirty-eight Labour Union officials have been found guilty of complicity in the MacNamara dynamite plot, including the wrecking of the Los Angeles Times building. Frank M. Ryan, President of the International Association of Bridge, Structural Ironworkers, is among those convicted. With the others he was accused of using Union funds to destroy the property of contractors who refused to recognize the Union. The court adjourned till 10 o'clock Monday, when sentence will be imposed. Only two men, Seiffert and Ridley, of the 49 union officials charged, were adjudged "not guilty." Almost a tragedy scene took place in the court room during a few minutes following the end of the trial. As States Marshal Schmidt ordered the prisoners, one by one, to step before the Court, the wives of a score of the men in the rear room, leaned pitifully over the railing calling for their husbands. The possible punishments vary from any minimum to 39½ years, at the discretion of the Court. Senator Kern, counsel for the prisoners, when told the verdict, declared that the cases would be appealed.

LONDON, Dec. 29.
Heart-rending stories of their terrible experiences during the Christmas gales in the English Channel, are told by many of the 300 passengers on the P. and O. liner Narrung, which arrived in the Thames to-day. The vessel, which had come from the Far East, met the full force of the hurricane off Ushant on Christmas Day. Great waves washed her decks from end to end, flooding most of the cabins. The passengers were driven from their berths and compelled to sit many hours, most of them in light clothing, knee deep in water. Finally an immense sea struck the vessel and crippled her. Wireless messages were at once sent off asking for assistance but before this arrived the captain had once more got her underway and was making his way, as well as he could, to the mouth of the Thames, where the Narrung arrived with a heavy list and everything on the decks smashed, and torn or washed away. From most of the southern ports come stories of the arrival of damaged vessels. Many of them were compelled to abandon the voyage on account of injuries suffered during the series of hurricanes of the last few days.

A young man who arrived here from the northward by the Prospero was relieved of \$60 at his boarding house in the West End, so he alleged to the police Wednesday, and yesterday Sergt. Byrne had the case in hand and arrested a resident of Green Bay on suspicion of the theft. He had his money on Wednesday night but missed it Wednesday. Though he did not suspect his room mate the police did and consequently arrested him under warrant.
