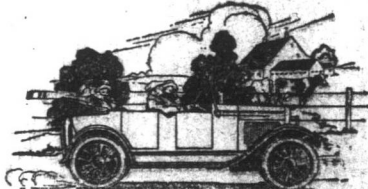

### GAME POSTPONED.

### TO-NIGHT'S PRELIMINARIES AT ST. GEORGE'S FIELD.

Owing to the large list of entries  
in the various events for the big  
sports day, the committee have decid-  
ed to run off preliminaries at St. Geo-  
rge's Field at 7 o'clock this evening.  
The following are the events:—100,  
200 yards, throwing javelin, throwing  
the hammer, putting shot, high jump,  
throwing the discus, Newfoundland  
tag of war, Boy Scouts' Relay. Five  
events will participate in the tag-of-  
war, while eight teams will take con-  
clusions in the Boy Scouts' Relay  
Race. Competitors entered for the  
above events are requested to be on  
the field 7 o'clock sharp.

### BIG SPORTS DAY TO-MORROW.

The big sports day, in honor of the  
visit of Field Marshal Earl Haig takes  
place at St. George's Field to-morrow  
afternoon, commencing at 2.30 sharp.  
All preparations for the successful  
conducting of the big meet, and the  
making of the day a real enjoyable  
one, is now complete, and all that is  
required is a fine day. A record at-  
tendance is forecasted. The pro-  
gramme includes sprints, weight-  
throwing, jumping, tag-of-war, inter-  
national Relay Race, 10 mile walk, 2  
Mile Road Race, display by the Girl  
Guides, and last, but not least, a num-  
ber of clowns off the warships will be  
seen in some very good stunts. An  
interesting feature in connection with  
the sports, will be the appearance of  
a number of reputed athletes from the  
British warship Constance and U.S.S.  
Lawrence, to compete against the lo-  
cals. With this in view, the various  
events promise to be very keenly con-  
tested and many of the local regards  
will no doubt be swept by the boards.  
Earl Haig and Staff are attending.  
His Excellency the Governor will also  
be present, with leading citizens.  
Unique programmes have been pro-  
vided. A feature will be the presence  
of the massed bands which will ren-  
der special items during the after-  
noon.

### EARL HAIG REGATTA.

Takes Place Wednesday Afternoon.  
On Wednesday afternoon a series  
of boat races will take place at his-  
toric Quidi Vidi Lake in honor of our  
distinguished visitor, Earl Haig. Up-  
wards of twenty crews will partici-  
pate and should the conditions be  
ideal the day promises to be a gala  
one. The final meeting will be held  
to-night when all crews will enter  
and draw positions and buoys.

Through the efforts of Capt. Bob  
Buck, arrangements have been made  
so that another race, to be known  
as the British Naval Race, will be  
held by three crews from H.M.S.  
Constance.

Four crews will participate in the  
Amateur Race. The last crew to en-  
ter will be stroked by Albert Martin  
who recently returned from Corner  
Brook. The personnel of the crew is  
as follows:—A. Martin (stroke), M.  
Chambers, Churchill, Martin, Ham-  
mond, Hannebury.

### A DARING VENTURE.

COPENHAGEN, June 28.  
Frederick DeWitt Wells, who re-  
cently purchased the Ketch Shanghai,  
left aboard the little craft yesterday,  
for New York, by way of Iceland,  
Greenland and Nfld. Wells was  
accompanied by Rockwell Kent, noted  
artist, and another friend. To ven-  
ture into Greenland waters so early  
in year is regarded among sailors  
here as daring almost suicidal.

### INTERESTING YACHT RACE.

HAMILTON, Bermuda, June 28.  
The last yacht of fourteen, which  
started last Saturday in race from  
New London, Conn., to Hamilton,  
crossed the finish line here yesterday  
morning. Winners of the race were  
announced last night as follows:—  
Memery, R. J. Beaver, Master, in Div-  
ision A, is awarded the Royal Ber-  
muda Yacht Club cup and the yacht-  
ing cup for all classes. In Class B,  
the Hutaka, B. Drake, Master, wins  
the Newhaven Yacht Club cup, and  
in Class C, the Lloyd W. Berry, Her-  
bert L. Stone, Master, is declared the  
winner, with the Misco, H. E. H. Hall,  
Master, second. Second race over  
course, from New London to Bermuda,  
was an exceedingly fast and interest-  
ing one. The yachtsmen report that  
it was sailed in light to moderate  
breezes and was made more interest-  
ing by the fact that throughout al-  
most every boat had a competitor in  
sight. The Yachts were becalmed in  
the Gulf Stream for seven hours Mon-  
day afternoon and evening, but at  
night the wind freshened to about a  
twenty-five miles an hour blow, ac-  
companied by hard squalls which  
made it necessary to shorten sail or  
to lower mainsails.

### Earl Haig at G.W.V.A. Headquarters

This morning at 11 o'clock Earl  
Haig accompanied by Col. Talbot  
A.D.C., and Capt. Donald Simpson,  
met the G. W. V. A. at headquarters,  
first inspecting a guard of naval and  
military men representing Newfound-  
land, who were lined up near the en-  
trance to the building. Following the  
inspection, the distinguished visitor  
and party were shown through the  
different offices by Tom Sec. Capt. G.  
Whitty. Accompanied by Col. Nangle,  
Earl Haig next paid a visit to the  
graves of the Veterans in the Church  
of England, Mount Carmel, General  
Protestant, Salvation Army and Bel-  
vedere Cemeteries where wreaths  
were placed on the graves. A drive  
was then taken to Quidi Vidi and Earl  
Haig saw the fishing fleet come in and  
chatted with some of the fishermen  
amongst whom was an ex-Service man  
who was captured by the Germans at  
Cambrai.

Memorial for to-morrow's unveiling

of about 500 tons of granite besides  
putting in hundreds of barrels of
