



### TRAINING FOR HALIFAX RACE.

The team of runners selected for the race have been undergoing hard training since Thursday last under the supervision of Mr. S. P. Cullen, their manager and trainer. Mr. Robertson, the first practice held on St. Bon's College Campus, the permission of Rev. Bro. Ryan, the room was also put at their disposal for the boys ran from Torbay to the cable, a distance of 5 1/2 miles, passed Gower Stone and O'Toole, over the entire course. The four runners travelled well, and the hills in a manner which was satisfactory to those in charge. Mr. Ashley gave the boys the use of a room at the Rectory, Torbay, and Rev. Bro. Ennis also accommodated them at Mount Cassel. To-night, the team will run from Brookfield to C.L.R. Armoury, taking in the hard work of LeMarchant Road. Lt. Col. Hall has given them permission to use the gym room and also the baths. It is quite possible that the runners will make another hike on Wednesday, over a course which is somewhat similar to that at Halifax. The suggested, is start from Renwick Mill Road and run over the Port Cove Road as far as Major's, then return over the same route, passing citywards take the Old Mill Cove Road at the Cross Road and lead to King's Bridge, thence way of Kenna's Hill to Mount Cassel. Roughly 6 1/2 miles will have been covered when the runners taken Kenna's Hill. This hill is somewhat similar to the Arm Hill at Halifax, only longer, and is about the same distance from the starting point.

**SWEDISH HOFF SMASHES OWN POLE VAULT MARK BY INCHES.**  
HELSINGFORS, Finland, Sept. 28.—Charles Hoff, of Norway, made pole vault at Abo yesterday, of 13 ft. 11 1/2 inches. This is claimed as a new record.

### MR. CULLEN AND THE HALIFAX RUNNERS.

Sporting Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir.—As several trainers and managers have been sent to Halifax with our athletes during the past three years, it is fairness to the other managers I must admit that I am the shameless one who let Ron. O'Toole develop bolts as mentioned in Mr. Geo. W. B. Ayre's letter published in your paper on Saturday last. I have no excuse to offer for this bad management or bad training, for I am guilty under both headings if Mr. Ayre's theory be right, for I not only trained O'Toole during our stay in Halifax, but also helped him train for three years previous to his making this trip, so I can't even pass the blame back to his former trainer.

If Mr. Ayre will read the Diary of the Newfoundland Track Team published in the Evening Telegram on September 19th, and September 21st, 1923, (I would be very pleased to show him copies) he will get the history of those bolts, I would ask him to please bear in mind when reading this Diary that most of it was written and mailed to the secretary of the Newfoundland Amateur Athletic Association before the sports took place. After Mr. Ayre reads this diary I would like him to tell me, (and I know others are interested in the question of a quick cure for bolts) how he would have prevented or cured the bolt on O'Toole's leg? He had bolts for two months after returning from Halifax, although undergoing treatment by one of our Doctors.

I believe it would be much kinder and of far more benefit to our athletes who are leaving for Halifax next Saturday, if Mr. Ayre would pass on any information or helpful hints he may have to give, to Mr. E. Robertson, who is the present manager and trainer of the team, than to criticize his management or condemn his training methods if our boys don't win, or perhaps tell him as he has told me, he ought to be ashamed of himself. Personally I do not feel the least bit ashamed. I gave my time and energy, and did my level best, no man can do more.

Whilst I agree with Mr. Ayre when he says our men should be sent a good time ahead, but we must not forget that every man on our team is a working man, and we must ask him or his employer to donate two, three or four weeks wages towards the trip. How many of us are prepared to put up from thirty to sixty dollars towards the trip, besides paying another man to do the work of the team man? One thing sport is supposed to teach us is to play fair. Is it fair to ask any employer to let a man off under full pay for four or five weeks during the busy season and brand him as being "No Sport" if he does not?

The Newfoundland Amateur Athletic Association are not sending the Team leaving on Saturday, this team is being sent by the Halifax-Marathon Sweep Committee, who are standing all expenses.

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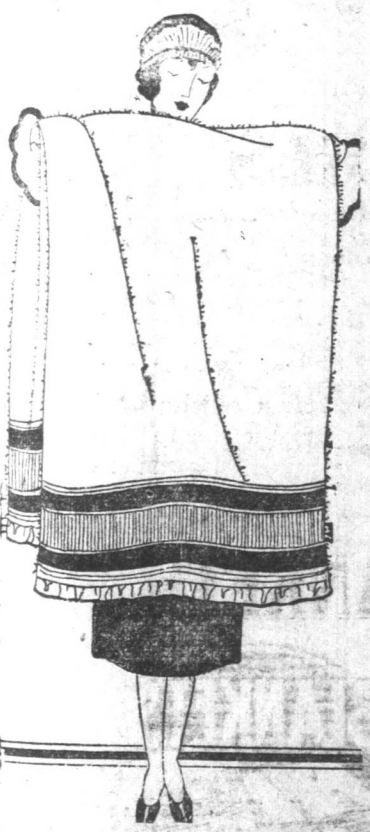

### PROCLAMATION.

By His Excellency  
Sir William Leonard Allardye,  
Knight Commander  
of the Most  
Distinguished Order  
of Saint  
Michael and Saint  
George, Governor  
and Commander-in-Chief

over the Colony  
of Newfoundland.

Whereas it is desirable that occasion should be afforded the people of this Colony to render thanks to Almighty God for the mercies He has been pleased to bestow upon this Colony during the past year, and to rejoice because of our National Blessings;

And Whereas Sunday, the Fifteenth day of November next, would be an appropriate occasion for the said Thanksgiving;

I do, therefore, by this my Proclamation, order and direct that Sunday, the Fifteenth day of November, next, shall be observed, throughout this Colony, as a Day of Thanksgiving, as aforesaid.

And I do further order and direct that Wednesday, the Eleventh day of November, next, being Armistice Day, shall be set apart and observed, throughout the Colony, as a Day of Rejoicing and a Public Bank Holiday, of which all persons concerned are hereby required to take due notice and govern themselves accordingly.
