Very many persons in cold weather dare not wash their hands either before going out or immediately after coming in, for if they do, even though the water they use be warm, their skin will burn so as to be painful, and it will look red besides.

They may avoid such an annoyance If they will rub on the hands a little old cream or camphor ice, allow it to remain on a moment or so and then remove it with a soft, old handkerchlef, either of silk or cambric. Another delightful emollient for the

If about one dram of acetic acid is used to one cause of giycerine it helps to remove almost any stains from the bands. If a woman is wise she will take the precaution to wear gloves when dusting a room or doing any kind of work that will soil her hands.



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Failures in Canada.

Failures in Canada. Canadian defaults during 1902 numbered 1,101, with liabilities of \$10,934,777. Numerically, this is the best statement in many years, and the amount involved is less than the average for a number of years, al-though slightly in excess of the \$10, \$11,671 reported in 1901. The de-crease of 240 failures occurred chief-ly in trading losses in Ontario and Quebec. Compared with liabilities of the preceding year there was notable improvement in manufacturing los-ses at Ontario, but a more than equivalent increase was reported in Quebec. Exactly the reverse is true as to trading liabilities, Queber re-porting a decrease of about half a million collars, while Ontario shows an increase. Otherwise the state-ment presents no striking contrast. -Dur's Review.
