### ENGLISH HOSPITALITY.

It is commonly said that the English are cold, phlegmatic, taciturn, protecting themselves by a cloak of frigid reserve from the advances of the stranger, and displaying a capacity for silence rather discouraging to the socially inclined.

These unpleasant impressions are happily contradicted by "Laicus" (Rev. Dr. Lyman Abbott) in the last Christian Union. Laicus writes from abroad that the greatest thing he saw in England was English hospitality. Not the cheap and easy hospitality which costs nothing more than a direction to the house-keeper to have the room made ready, and the additional plate at the table, but the asspitality which means giving up a day's business, and consecrating the day to friendly offices. He finds the Englishman's

love to be without dissimulation. If he welcomes you, you know that you are wel come; and no people know better how to make a stranger feel thoroughly at home. The Englishman know in social followship no half-way measures. "He either takes you wholly into his companionship and nakes you his friend, or he leaves you out

of doors altogether."

Judging from this latest report of the impressions of an American in the mother country it would seem that Englishman has the average Englishman has little aptitude or liking for mere acquaintance ship. The interchange of conventional courtesies, the light touch and go of superficial contact, is not to his taste. He is too sincere, too thorough, perhaps too right minded, to lend himself to social trivialities or pretenses. He keeps his heart warm by not wearing it on his sleeve. Doubtless it is the sharply-drawn class distinctions in England which makes the Englishman's reserve a barrier so strong that a stranger has to be admitted behind it in order to be sure

of receiving decent treatment.

The people of the United States, and to a large extent we Canadians also, have comparatively less regard for arbitrary class distinctions. We have been ridiculed for our lack of social reverence, but we may congratulate ourselves if we are equally free from social contempt. If we are re-proached for not looking up, let us say to our credit that at least we do not look down. The core of new world hospitality is a cordial recognition of the humanity and the equal rights of all-including those who are strangers to us. We believe that, as Henry James says,
"aristocracy is organized bad manners,"
and we recognize no manners as good save those which flow from a good heart. The single criticism to be made on the Englishman's idea of hospitality is that it involves the treating of his friends particularly well. American and Canadian hospitality takes or professes to take for its motto, "Treat everybody well."


