THE WEATHER.

TORONTO, Oct. 6-11 p.m.—The storm center still hovers over the Gulf of St. Lawrence, and another of as yet less importance is moving quickly east across the lakes. Strong westerly winds and gales are still prevalent in Eastern Canada. The weather has been fine and warmer to-day in the lake region, and has continued fine and warm in the Northwest.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Victoria, 44°-58°; Calgary, 26°-80°; Edmonton, 28°-72°; Prince Albert, 40°-68°; Winnipeg, 40°-68°; Toronto, 30°-68°; Montreal, 40°-50°; Quebec, 38°-50°; Halifax, 42°-54°.

LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—Rev. J. Murray and wife, Hamilton, are at the Grigg.

—Mr. J. Ardell, of Grand Rapids, Mich., formerly of this city is home on a visit.

—Jan. Frezoli, of this city, left to-day to attend Trinity Medical College, Toronto.

—Col. Aymer, of this city, is expected on Thursday inspecting the armories of companies one and six.

—T. M. Diggins, in advance of "Love and Money," which appears at the Opera House next week, is at the Tecumseh.

—A sneak thief stole all the clothes from the lines in Thomas W. Cannon's yard, 428 Dufferin avenue, one night last week.

—Postoffice Inspector Barker is in Windsor tracing up the record of the parties who ran the Union Advertising Agency.

—The Stratford Town Council has determined to revise the charter of the Stratford, Port Stanley and Port Frank Railway.

—Mr. T. R. Parker has returned from his trip to the coast, which proved beneficial and pleasant. He says it is a grand country out there.

—The London Athletic Club meets tonight to organize for the season and to form a football club superior, it is claimed, to anything in the city.

—A Ferguson correspondent writes: "We are sorry to hear of the serious illness of Mrs. John Thompson, sen., in London, where she is visiting her daughter. Latest accounts are much more favorable."

—Mr. John Leonard Smyth, formerly of this city, but for many years a resident of Roscommon, Mich., has received the Republican nomination for Judge of Probate for Roscommon county. John is a son of Major J. B. Smyth.

—Mrs. English (Helmuth College), Mrs. Seabrook, Miss F. Labatt, Miss Dullen, Mrs. Edge, Mrs. Richardson, Mrs. Falls, Mrs. Marsh and Mrs. Lings are the London delegates to the Women's Auxiliary Missionary Association of the Diocese of Huron meeting in Chatham.

—Section 73 of the License Act says: "If any person licensed under this act permits any drunken person to consume any intoxicating liquors in his premises he shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding \$50," which is generally known.

—Mr. G. W. Russell, of the firm of Russell & Officer, Denver, Col., made a flying visit to his friends here this week. The firm is busily engaged in fitting up electrical apparatus for the Chicago exposition.

—Mr. Russell is an old London boy.

—"Passers by the corner of Princess avenue and Colborne street last evening were forced to listen to 'fresh' remarks from a well-dressed, cigarette-smoking gang of hoodlums, who should be looked after sharply by the police." So writes a citizen.

—Several cars on a G. T. R. way freight going west were derailed near Mount Brydges last evening through a heavy stone falling on the track from one of the flat cars. No material damage was done, though it caused a blockade of the track for an hour or two. T. G. Davey, of this city, was in the way freight caboose, which rolled into the ditch.

—The Templar for this week has this paragraph: "The noted and scholarly orator, Axel Gustafson, has consented to deliver a series of addresses in Canada. A sufficient number of places apply for him promptly. The editor of the Templar, Hamilton, will act for those who desire to hear Mr. Gustafson, free entirely of any charge or commission to either party. Apply at once."

—Messrs. McEllen (acting chairman), J. S. Dewar, D. W. Blackwell, Graig, Cook, Anderson, Jeffery and Turner, Secretary Abbott and City Engineer Grayson attended a meeting of No. 2 committee of the Board of Education last evening. The addition to Princess avenue school, to be built by Jones Bros., will be finished by February. The janitor of Talbot street school will be charged \$10 a month for his cottage and the board will pay the water rates. The matter of securing help for the janitor of the Collegiate Institute was laid over. The matter of lighting the various night schools will be attended to. Electric lights will likely be used.

The London Presbytery.

At the recent meeting in St. Thomas of the Presbytery of London the call from Mount Rev. Mr. Miller, of the Free Church of Scotland, was taken up. Commissioners from Moss church were heard in support of the call, and Mr. Miller signified his willingness to accept. The Presbytery sustained the call, and the induction was fixed to take place on Oct. 18, Rev. D. Currie to preside and address the people. Rev. Mr. Hamilton to address the minister and Rev. Dr. McKay to preach. The salary to be paid is \$850 per year, with four weeks' holidays. The Presbytery adjourned to meet in London the second Tuesday in November.

Death of Mr. Edward W. Rowell.

The death of Mr. Edward W. Rowell at his mother's residence in South London last evening removes a young man of great promise. In addition to high moral qualities and good natural abilities, he had an unusual aptitude for business, and though only 27 years of age had risen to the position of buyer for the wholesale firm of Messrs. John Green & Co. He was a brother of Mr. Newton W. Rowell the talented young barrister of Toronto. Deceased was a prominent church worker and took a deep interest in both educational and religious matters. Malarial fever and its developments were the causes of death. His mother, who was only last week called upon to mourn the death of her brother, will have heartfelt sympathy.

London Talent at Hideron.

A very pleasant time was spent at Hideron in connection with the opening of the new English Church, a harvest home dinner and entertainment being the center of attraction. A warm dinner was served in the agricultural hall from 5:30 p.m. till 7 p.m., where a large number partook of the refreshments

so ably provided and served by the ladies of the congregation. An adjournment was made to the Oddfellows' Hall, where a pleasing entertainment was rendered. Rev. Mr. Diehl acting as chairman. The programme consisted of an address by Rev. Mr. Diehl; recitations by Misses Shipley and Carmichael; solos by the following Londoners: Mrs. Cooper, the Misses Land, Messrs. J. Bonshy, J. O'Neill and A. E. Westman; quartets by the Misses Land, Messrs. Bonshy and Westman. The orchestra of the Falcon Club, of London, provided numerous fine selections, all of which were well accepted. Great credit is due Rev. Mr. Diehl and congregation for the success they have met with in raising subscriptions, there being only about \$500 debt remaining on the church.

JAMES' WOOING

Described by Miss Matilda Doherty.

Stratford Assize Court Proceedings Spiced With a Touch of Promise Case.

STRAITFORD, Oct. 6.—The proceedings of the Stratford Assize Court were enlivened yesterday with a spicy breach of promise trial. Matilda Doherty, a stylishly-dressed young lady, residing near Millbank, stepped into the box and told how she had been wooed and won by a wealthy young farmer, the son of an adjoining neighbor. She met him first at a dance, where the acquaintance was formed. They met again at a party where, after paying her considerable attention, he requested the pleasure of being permitted to visit her at her home. His visits were usually once per week. The old folks retired early, and on the parlor sofa James and Matilda discussed the marriage question pro and con, whereupon, she alleges, he asked her to become his partner in life. She did not know of any reason for refusing, but could not decide right on the spot. The next visit they occupied the same sofa, and, to use her own words, she inquired if he meant what he said, that she wasn't flirting, and didn't want him to come around doing so; that if he meant business she had decided to gratify his request. After assuring her that he was not flirting, he begged of her to name the date when true happiness would become a reality. She suggested that Christmas time, which was near at hand, would afford an opportunity of carrying his promise into effect, but he thought it was just a little too soon. The old house leaked, and he wanted a little time to tidy up things about the farm. She urged that all this was no excuse; even if the roof needed mending, let the wedding go on. They might as well get it over with. He begged of her to name the date when true happiness would become a reality. 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
