London, Dec. 10.-It is understood that when the French census is taken next year it will show, for the first time in the history of France a smaller population than that of the British Island. There was only a difference of about half a million in 1891, and this has been made up nearly twice over by the heavier British birth rate Economists have been pointing out to the French for years, without much effect, that their relatively diminishing population made it impossible that they go on spending vast sums to maintain a fighting equality with people getting so much bigger than themselves. Perhaps this being over taken by the British, who, at the beginning of the century had only 16,-000,000 to France's 27,000,000, will appeal to the French imagination.

DISGRACEFUL ELECTION SCENES. London, Dec. 10.—Ostensibly, one of the two seats of Southampton won by the Tories in July is vacated by the election judges on the ground that a Tory agent gave a voter a half-dol-lar railway fare, and the candidate in whose interest this was done permitted himself to be drawn about by a procession of drunken costers. The truth is, though, that the whole election there, as in a hundred other provincial towns, was made one colossal debauch by free beer on the Tory side. and if the judges regarded the spirit instead of the letter of the Corrupt Practices Act, the borough would be disfranchised altogether. It is not known if Sir Francis Evans, whose American wife so distinguished herself in the previous bye-election, will consent to be the Liberal candidate for the vacancy. He might win, but, as a rule, constituencies punish candidates who put them to the expense of an election petition trial.

The Sultan's Latest Kick.

Wants British Bluejackets Withdrawn from the Embassy-Another Uprising Feared in Constantinople.

Constantinople, Dec. 10.-The Sultan refuses to continue negotiations on the subject of permitting the European warships to enter the Bosphorus, unless Great Britain withdraws the bluejackets landed to guard the British Embassy. The British claim that the Embassy was surrounded by Turkish spies.

The Turks, however, assert that the so

called "spies" were really Turkish police agents who were sent to give additional protection to the Embassy at the first rumor that members of the Embassy were in state of alarm. As an offset to the state ment that quiet prevails here, rumors which apparently have a solid foundation, are current of a wholesale conspiracy here which may have had the ulti-mate object of deposing the Sul-tan and which certainly would result in great bloodshed and consequent danger to the lives and property of foreigners. That the conspiracy was of a most important nature may be judged from the fact that the Sultan's aide-de-camp, Hazzan Djemi Pasha, is believed to have been the conspirator who was to have led the disaffected of the imperial guards into the palace, and to have seized the person of the Sultan, and is now a fugitive. The police are known to be taking the most careful precautions in anticipation of a fresh outbreak upon the part of the Armenians, who are said to be determined to make a fresh demonstration.
