ALERTS DEFEAT THE CRESCENTS

The Alerts won their first championship game on Saturday from the Crescents of Toronto by a score of 16 to 4. A good crowd witnessed the contest and thoroughly enjoyed the luck of the Alerts, who had the game easily in their grasp after the third inning. The home team put up a clever batting and fielding game. It must not be understood that the batting was the cause of substituting Ward for Young in the fourth. The latter was very wild, and was hit for five safe hits in the three innings, four successive hits being made in the second. The team did not support him at critical stages. The Crescents are good ball-players, as was seen in the fifth to the eighth innings, when through sharp fielding but thirteen Alerts went to bat. The team was placed according to the score card. Their catcher, Little Holden, is the star of their team. His weight does not deter him from batting, running and catching like an old leaguer. The Crescents are weak at the bat, as evidenced by the few hits secured off Carney and a total of nine strikeouts. Ward, their pitcher, has a jerking delivery. He is quick in watching the bases, and caught Burton easily off first in the eighth inning. Their tallies were made in the first, second, sixth and seventh, and every run was scored with the assistance of errors. Carney's twirling was superb. His speed was great, and never once did he slacken up in delivery. Only one Crescent got first on balls. He hit two batsmen and struck out nine men. Fred Wood's playing was magnificent. His five times at bat realized four hits, with a total of seven bases. He had two runs, two stolen bases, two put-outs and three assists, and assisted in a double play. His pick-up of a hard ground hit in the ninth was the best play of the game. Jack Plaster, after the first inning, also played a beautiful game. His throwing to first was faultless. He showed practice to touch the runner from the left side, instead of turning and touching him with the right hand. He lost a put-out certainly in this way on Saturday. Hynd was the only Alert who did not secure a safe hit. He struck out twice. Thorpe caught splendidly and batted out two nice singles. HAMILTON BICYCLE CLUB RACES.
The Hamilton Bicycle Club, the Hamilton Bicycle Club were favored with fine weather and good luck for their annual race meeting yesterday. A couple of Canadian records were lowered.

Three open races were present. Brown and Young, the fast tandem team of the Wanderers, Toronto, went a fast mile against time, and succeeded in lowering the record by nearly three seconds, making the mile in 2:04 4-5, best previous record, 2:11.

First race, 1 mile, novice—W. A. Fulkner, Buffalo, first; Arthur W. Tilley, Y. M. C. A., Hamilton, second; W. Clark, Hamilton, third. Time, 2:33 3-4.

Second race, 1 mile, open class—B. A. McLeod, Sarnia, first; C. H. Callahan, Buffalo, second; W. Lutz, Buffalo, third. Time, 1:04 1-5. This was 5 seconds better than best previous record.

Third race, extra, same class as first, for late entries—S. A. Oak, Toronto, first; C. McLean, Toronto, second; Fred Davidson, Toronto, third. Time, 2:33 3-4.

Fourth race, one mile, 2:50 class, class A, open to riders of class A who never won a mile race in 2:50 or better—W. Barnes, Hamilton, first; F. Loughhead, Toronto, second; C. G. FROM A MEDICAL STANDPOINT.
In a most interesting article in the Review Scientific, a well known French physician, Dr. Chibret, writes a lance for cycling from a medical point of view. He says that on a cycle the attitude of the body is that of a quadruped, and no longer of a biped, and is unconsciously adapted to realize a maximum of motion with a minimum of fatigue. The doctor further contends that during cycling the whole body is working the arms, which support the rider, the lower back, which is in oscillation; the back, which keeps up the equilibrium, and the legs, which produce the action. There are many other points mentioned in the article, and it is interesting to note that a medical man would bring into prominence the advantages of this sport, and thus remove the regrettable ignorance which still exists on the subject in many quarters.

A French physician writes approvingly and at some length on bicycling for women believes that the training it gives to hand and eye and muscles will make women walk better and carry themselves more gracefully and freely than they do. He has noticed that while a few women walk well and preserve a satisfactory balance, the ef-

fect is ruined by their indecision and uncertainty of movement at street crossings. Other weaknesses that are very prevalent among women in middle life are obesity and shortness of breath, and these, he believes, are to be overcome by riding the wheel.

HOW TO INFLATE THE TIRES.

Don't have tires so badly as make them seem like tubular pancakes, nor yet so hard that a rope would afford greater resistance and life. Favor the front tire with less inflation than the rear one, which has all the weight of the rider to support. No tires should be inflated beyond a point where a certain amount of "give" results from thumb pressure. If you must commit an error in tire inflation let it be in the direction of too little, not too much, inflation. The heavier the rider the harder the tires must be inflated. On wet and slippery roads the harder the tire is pumped the less danger will there be.

THE WHEEL.

A one-mile match race has been arranged between Arthur A. Zimmerman and S. J. Scholten, to run at Asbury Park during the July meet, for \$10,000. Five thousand dollars will be put up by each man and \$5,000 more by the Asbury Park. A. C. Johnson, who hitherto objected riding at a Las Vegas meet, accepted Zimmerman's challenge.

Welter's simple request was that the sheriff be seen and allow his sisters, Mrs. Boughner and Mrs. La Monte, the latter of whom is a resident of Buffalo, to see him, Mr. Macdonald acceded to the request, and subsequently the relatives saw their brother for the last time.

Before he parted with the condemned man, Welter said that he had heard that Mary Hendershott and Charley Welter had been arrested in connection with the murder, and that Provincial Detective Murray was in the city.

Mr. Macdonald said that such was not the case, and that if such a rumor was in circulation it could only have one meaning—that it had been given out with the object of extorting a confession from either him or Hendershott.

"If that is the case," said Welter, "they are after the wrong nigger."

This ended the interview, and as Mr. Macdonald prepared to leave the accused, he asked him to be brave, now that he had to face death, to die like a man.

Welter said: "You can trust me for that."

Mr. Macdonald walked across the corridor to Hendershott's cell, and found him deeply absorbed in his Bible. Hendershott was not at all prepared for the interview, having in part feared the conversation which had passed between Welter and his counsel. He was much more depressed, however, than Welter, and gave way to his emotions.

"I suppose you have heard what we have been talking about?" said Mr. Macdonald, as he took the prisoner's extended hand.

"Yes," answered Hendershott, "What an awful position to be placed in."

"Yes," said the lawyer, "Death is always awful in any form, but after all it makes little material difference whether we die today or twenty years hence, and (generally) there are many people today who would gladly trade positions with you."

Hendershott tried to return his friend's smile, with a ghostly smile for a moment lit up his features. He said: "I would like you to produce some of them, and I would trade positions with them, might I?"

Mr. Macdonald consoled with the prisoner, and encouraged him to meet his fate as befitted a man. He promised to see him often, and counseled him to look to his spiritual welfare, in which he would find great solace during the trying hours that separated him from his last moments.

Hendershott was engaged to a most estimable young woman in St. Thomas, and asked if she had seen him during his confinement. He answered, no, but expressed a desire to see her before he died. This request was not permitted by the jail authorities.

Before Mr. Macdonald left Hendershott, he had resigned his composure, and promised to hear up bravely.

THE RELATIVES PROSTRATED.
Probably the most trying duty which Mr. Macdonald has been called upon to perform was in imparting to the relatives the news he had received from Ottawa. After leaving the jail he drove at once to the home of Prisoner Welter's sister, Mrs. Boughner, where were assembled, besides Mrs. Boughner, Miss Hendershott, Mrs. Welter, mother of the prisoner, and Mrs. La Monte, of Buffalo. The news came to Mrs. Boughner with crushing force. When informed of the Ottawa report, she at once fell into a swoon, from which she was not revived until a physician had been summoned by Mr. Macdonald. The other relatives were also prostrated.

THEIR SPIRITUAL ADVISER.
Rev. Mr. Spencer spent half an hour with the prisoners on Saturday, engaged in earnest prayer. The men took the greatest interest in his ministrations. Mr. Spencer also saw them on Saturday night, during which time the men had been made aware of the fact that the law must take its course. Mr. Spencer said to the reporter that, while the men showed signs of emotion, they had not given way completely, and conducted themselves in a most courageous manner, considering the strain on their nerves.
