Latest Happenings in This Section of the Province.

The Typhoid Epidemic in Windsor—Doctors Investigating—A Noted Squaw Dead.

Mrs. Elijah Pound, of Richmond, aged 97, died on Friday. She settled in Malahide in 1817.

T. F. Hinnegan has bought the Queen's Hotel, Wallaceburg. The price paid was \$10,000.

J. H. Burke, farmer, of lot 17, con. 10, East Zorra, lost his house by fire on Thursday afternoon. Loss, \$1,000; insurance, \$800.

Hon. John Costigan has written Hon. David Mills, promising a full investigation of the complaint about dead fish in the River Thames.

A Chatham man is accused of throwing a live cat into his stove and burning the animal to death. The police may take the case in hand.

The editor of the Wallaceburg News apologizes for calling the members of the village council boodlers, but claims they did not treat him fairly.

One hundred persons were baptized in the River Sydenham at Dresden on Sunday week, the result of the recent revival services held at that town.

Some of the residents of Windsor are suspected of smuggling dutiable articles from the States, and to put a stop to it the Government has sent to that port Special Officer Stinson.

David Cope, one of the oldest residents of St. Catharines, died at St. George on Friday, aged 84. He was a prominent Methodist, a life-long reformer, and was appointed a magistrate about 50 years ago.

The cable between Pelee Island and the mainland will be repaired as soon as the weather will permit. The steamship Imperial will carry the mail to the island, and will be replaced by Kingsville, as formerly.

On Saturday morning the barns of James Anker, Malden, were struck by lightning and totally destroyed by fire. Seventeen tons of hay and a large quantity of grain were burned, as well as three head of cattle. Four other head were injured. The loss will be about \$1,200.

J. F. Wilkinson, of St. Thomas, has purchased six acres of land from the Hales, on the Port Stanley road. It is Mr. Wilkinson's intention to place the place up as picnic grounds. The park will be nicely fixed up, and the venture should prove a success, especially if electric cars run to Port Stanley.

Mrs. Joseph Warrow, one of the oldest residents of this county, died at her home in Malden township Friday. Her husband was the son of a noted chief of the Wyandotte tribe of Indians, and he and his wife had always resided in the county. She has been confined to her room for two years, and since last August had been totally blind.

Petroleum Advertiser: Much genuine sympathy is felt for Dr. and Mrs. Dunfield in the loss they have sustained by the untimely death at the early age of 14 years, of their son, Arthur Wellington. He fell ill, and appendicitis set in, which was followed by peritonitis, and resulted in his death on Tuesday. He was a bright little fellow, and will be much missed by his heartbroken parents.

Dr. Bryce and McDonald, the secretary and president of the Provincial Board of Health, who are at present engaged in taking evidence with a view to arriving at a satisfactory conclusion of what was the cause of the recent epidemic of typhoid fever in Windsor, are still taking evidence. If the Provincial Board decides that the supply of water now being used by the citizens is detrimental to the public health, it can order any change which it considers will be beneficial. The act governing the Provincial Board of Health gives it almost unlimited powers, and if it deems it necessary that the intake should be changed, the city will have to do so.

DEADLY DIPHTHERIA. Port Huron, Mich., April 13.—The family of John Skomrock has been stricken with diphtheria. Five persons in all have come down with the dread disease, two children are dead and the three others are in a precarious condition.

HE GAZED AT THE SUN. Ypsilanti, April 13.—Fred, the young son of Charles Reinhardt, was recently the victim of a most distressing accident. The young boy, finding a prism of yellow-colored glass, attempted to find amusement by holding it to his eye and looking at the sun. The rays focused in such a manner as to destroy the sight. This sad fact was discovered by Dr. Huxton, who was called to treat the boy for a violent headache, from which he afterwards complained. There is little hope but that amnesia will set in and destroy the sight of the other eye.

Making Cigars.

London Last Year Stood Second in the Whole Dominion.

Producing Over Twenty-One and a Quarter Millions.

London's Fifteen Factories Turned Out Four Times More Than Toronto's Nineteen—Half an Hour in One of London's Model Manufactories.

London produced 21,297,875 cigars in the year ending June 30, 1895. On these the Government collects a duty of 8¢ on every thousand. This is equal to three-fifths of a cent on each cigar, making \$127,787 25. Add to this the \$1,135 license fees paid by the fifteen factories—\$128,922 25—and you have a pretty correct idea of the cigar tax paid by London manufacturers.

London ranks second in Ontario as regards the number of factories, but first in the amount of tobacco used and the number of cigars produced. Toronto, with its nineteen factories—four more than London—produced only 5,325,695 cigars, just one-fourth of the number produced here. Hamilton, with only one less factory than London, produced only 3,557,710 cigars. Montreal is the only place in the whole Dominion that produces more cigars than the Forest City, and notwithstanding the enormous disparity in population, Montreal only produces 42,157,739 cigars out of 22 factories.

The war in Cuba is already having its effect on the local cigar manufacturers who make Havana filled cigars. Already raw Havana tobacco is very much higher in price, and the war has also had its effect on the price of cigars.

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chine. The product is called waste for revenue purposes, and the whole is sifted and cleaned, and then shipped to England and Germany to make "tobacco."

The desks in the packing room are covered with green cloth. All cigars are packed on first-class boxes, and with such a background that the different shades of color can be distinguished. Osmos and Claros are packed in different boxes. These terms are Spanish for dark and light, or clear. Left-hand cigars are packed separately, and so are the right-hand makes. The output is packed in quantities of 25, 50, 100 and 200. At Christmas time few boxes are packed containing ten cigars. These are they that impatient Christmas shoppers seize upon for present making. Fifteen and one hundred are the usual sizes, and boxes of 25 are never packed unless in high-priced goods. After being packed the boxes are taken to the press room and pressed. Then they are stamped with the inland revenue stamp and seal. The stamp contains the number of the factory and the number of the inland revenue division.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRES.

A Dozen Detroit Firemen Narrowly Escape Death—Leaving for Life from a Blazing Tenement.

Cleveland, O., April 13.—Early yesterday morning fire broke out in the Gehring apartment house in Murchison street, forty, raised and lived in the building, and as they rushed for the fire escapes and stairways a wild scene of confusion ensued. Mary Cox, waitress, aged 17, roomed with her sister Annie on the third floor, and was out of from the fire escape. With her nightgown and hair in flames she jumped to breaking but her arm and receiving other severe injuries. Mrs. John Berlotucca jumped from the second story, and was badly bruised. James Kinswator fell through a burning floor and was seriously injured. Twenty families lost all their furniture and clothing. The loss is about \$15,000.

Detroit, April 13.—About a dozen members of the fire department had narrow escapes at a fire which partly destroyed one of the warehouses of the Riverside Storage Company (Limited), located on Woodbridge street east, on Saturday evening. All of them were overcome by smoke, but with the exception of one man all are expected to go on duty again within a day or two.

One man, however, Charles D. Harp, a pipefitter of engine company No. 5, was overcome by smoke, and while his comrades were trying to drag him out of the burning building, he fell, striking on the back of his head. He was taken to Harper Hospital, where he remained in an unconscious condition most of the night. The injury seems to be internal. The money loss is between \$60,000 and \$100,000.

Niagara Falls, Ont., April 13.—The partial three-story residence of Mr. J. Orr Doran, of the Dominion Suspender Co., on the river front, was totally destroyed by fire yesterday morning. The place had been occupied by Mr. J. A. Langmuir, manager of the Imperial Bank here, who moved out last Friday to allow Mr. Doran to occupy the premises himself. The house was fully furnished with all modern furniture, and the whole was totally destroyed, along with a large stock of silverware. Loss to building, \$10,000; on furnishings, \$4,600.

COMFORT FOR CUBANS.

Three Vessels Land Men and Arms in Aid of the Revolution.

Havana, April 13.—Elections for 30 members of the Cortes were held yesterday (Sunday). The candidates of the Union Constitutional party were the only ones in the field. The other parties declining to take part in the elections. The vote was extremely tight. Numerous encounters between Government troops and rebels are reported from the different provinces.

There has been considerable fighting around the military line across the line. Foes of insurrection recently entered the Province of Havana from the east. They appear to be gathering near the Trocha.

A Madrid dispatch says: Capt. Gen. Weyler has asked for the immediate dispatch of 5,000 cavalry to Cuba, and the Minister of War is arranging to send them at once. The War Office is also considering the question of employing balloons in the military service in Cuba. The naval squadron at Ferrol has gone to Vigo to begin the maneuvers.

Key West, Fla., April 13.—News has been received here of the landing on Cuban soil of an expedition commanded by Col. Monson Aquilino, which was composed of 45 men, 800 rifles, 400,000 cartridges and a large amount of dynamite. Although the expedition cost but \$50,000, it is considered as important as those of Garcia and Collazo, because no money was sent on a steamer for it. Senor Colas, with special orders from Delegate Palma, managed the affair in Key West and Tampa.

Word has also been received here that two schooners loaded with men and ammunition, but having no arms, were wrecked on the coast of Cuba, and arrived safely in Cuba, leaving their cargoes in the hands of Gen. Macao's army.

The steamer Scotsman, from Liverpool, has on board 200 boys, whom she will land at Portland, Me., whence they will proceed to Western Canada. They are from Bernards Home for Boys, and are to be placed with residents of provinces in the west.
