TRIED TO KILL THE SHAH.
London, June 23.—A member of the Bab Society recently tried to assassinate the new Shah at Teheran. His Majesty was not hurt. The would-be murderer was arrested.

CRETE'S NEW GOVERNOR.
Constantinople, June 23.—Georgi Pasha Berovitch, Prince of Samos, first functionary of the Ottoman Empire, has been appointed Governor of the island of Crete. Abdullah Pasha, whom he replaces in the governorship, will retain command of the Turkish forces in the island.

NINE YEARS FOR FRAUD.
London, June 23.—M. Arton, who was prominently identified with the Panama Canal scandal, has been sentenced to nine years' imprisonment at hard labor for his complicity in the fraudulent transactions which led to the scandal, and to pay back the money he embezzled from the company.

WHITES RESCUED.
London, June 23.—Many white settlers, who lived in isolated parts of Rhodesia, and who were in danger of being massacred by the rebellious Matabels, have been taken in safety to Umtali by the troops sent to their rescue. The telegraph line between Umtali and Port Salisbury has been cut by the rebels.

DEATH OF A DIVER.
Sydney, N. S. W., June 23.—Prof. Peart, the colonial champion diver and swimmer, when essaying to plunge a distance of 70 feet, struck the side of the tank and received such injuries as to cause his death in a few hours. His greatest performance was 227 feet.

THE HARRIS FUNERAL.
London, June 23.—The funeral of Sir Augustus Harris took place at Brompton cemetery Saturday. This was a remarkable gathering of notable persons, and the service was marked with floral wreaths. The casket was borne by the Duke and Duchess of York, the Duke and Duchess of Devonshire, and the Duke and Duchess of Cambridge.

STEAMSHIP LOST.
London, June 23.—A dispatch from Sydney, New South Wales, says: The British ship Scottish Dales (Capt. MacCarthy), from Tacoma, on April 28, for Port Piere, has been totally wrecked near Valtoa. All the members of the crew were saved and were landed at Suva. The Scottish Dales was a double-decked ship, of nearly 2,000 tons register, hailed from Liverpool, and was owned by W. H. Ross & Co.

DICKERING WITH THE DANES.
London, June 23.—The Times publishes a dispatch from Copenhagen, saying that the suggestion in the Republican platform, adopted by the St. Louis convention, that the United States should purchase the Danish colonies in the West Indies, creates some sensation. It is believed that the Americans covet St. Thomas, the naval station. The consensus of opinion in Danish circles is that the government is prepared to sell at a suitable price.

A CANADIAN CASE.
London, June 23.—The Judicial committee of the Privy Council has granted leave to appeal the case of Delap v. Charlbois, the Northwest Corner Railway dispute. This is the case which involves the ownership of the stock and bonds of the Great Northern Railway, amounting to over one million. The railway was seventeen years ago, and the trial, including the present appeal, has been a long one.
