BASEBALL.

ALISA CRAIG STARS AGAIN VICTORIOUS.

The Stars of Alisa Craig are a purely local amateur organization. Of the 12 men played this year, 8—Edwards, Jamieson, Andy Gunn, John Gunn, Kennedy, Campbell, Finan and Morgan—have lived there for 30 years, Mahler for seven and Bachus for three, while Barnes was born in East Williams and within three miles of Alisa Craig. The Stars' winning percentage for 1909 is 500, or eight games won out of ten played, and they are anxious to add to the scalp locks of the Knox and Pastimes, but have so far been unable to arrange a game with either of those clubs. The Stars pay no salaries, and while willing to pay traveling and hotel expenses, will not furnish money to enable visiting teams to "fill up" with professionals, as did the Alerts, in 1899, when they played on the field Mohler, Cope, Lehman and Seivers, and then when in the ninth inning the Stars went in with four runs to tie and five to win, which they accomplished without the loss of a man, it was the most ragged exhibition of baseball seen there this season. The Stars made 14 errors, resulting in 12 runs for the Stratforths; Finan gave one charity, which resulted in a run, and the Stratforths earned two more, making their score 15. The Stratforths made five errors, from which the home team pulled out six runs, while McLaughlin's charities became, by good base-running and timely hits, five runs, and the balance of five runs were earned by the local players.
