The British gunboat Sand Piper foundered and some of her sea-men were lost. The American ship Benjamin Sewell went ashore, and in all 77 steam launches were wrecked, and over 200 natives were drowned. At Klowloon and other points there

> John Gordon Sprigg, Lord Roberts explains that farm-burning has been ordered strictly in accordance with

the usages of war. He says in part: "Whether the people whose houses are burned are actual accessories to the cutting of railways and other damage must be left to the general officers commanding to decide. They must be trusted to make a full inquiry before having recourse to extreme measures; but as this is essentially police work, I anticipate that when the police are established we shall find the necessity for burning gradually disappear with less danger of the innocent suffering, and that my successor will eventually be able to abolish alto-

gether a distasteful task.' The Times points out that a Boer does not consider that he has a farm at all unless he controls ten square miles, and there is not one farmhouse by any means to every ten square miles of territory. So to burn all the farm-houses within ten miles of the scene of a raid upon the railway may mean very little in point of

numbers. Forty-one proclamations of Lord Roberts' have been published. They have been mostly summarized previously in the newspapers. The last one (dated Nov. 18) says: pears to be some misunderstanding as regards the burning of farms, the commander-in-chief wishes the following to be the lines upon which general officers commanding are to act: 'No farm is to be burned except for an act of treachery, or when our troops are fired on from the premises, or as purishment for the breaking of railway or telegraph, or when used as bases of operations for raids, and then only with the direct consent of the general officer commanding. The mere fact that a burgher is absent on commando is on no account to be used as a reason for burning his house. All cattle, wagons, and foodstuffs are to be removed from all farms. If that is impossible, they are to be destroyed,

whether the owner is present or not. FIGHTING NIGHT AND DAY. London, Dec. 12.-The struggle between Dewet and Knox has been in a critical stage for ten days past. It has been waged under circumstances of extreme hardship for both combatants. The soldiers have had practically no sleep, and have marched and fought night and day, most of the time in heavy rains. Lord Kitchener's hand clearly appears in the manner of the

This pressing of the British troops with the same relentless rigor characterized the march from Kimberley to Paardeberg. It will be remembered that in that march Lord Kitchener reduced the British cavalry to immobility by destroying the British horses. Some London men fear that unless Gen. Dewet's capture is speedily effected Gen. Knox's mounts will be rendered useless and will leave his force strand-

Even should the great Orange River raider fall a victim to Gen. Knox's tireless chase, it is not expected that the Boer guerilla campaign will be over. Generals Botha, Delarey, Viljoen and Hertzog remain in the field, each commanding from 500 to 2,500 seasoned burghers. These troops are scat-

MAY LAND AT ST. JOHN. Ottawa, Dec. 13.-A cable has been sent to the war office asking that instructions be given for the Lake Champlain to land the home-coming Canadians at St. John, N. B. It is feared. however, that the vessel left before getting the order, in which event the debarkation would take place at Halifax. The people of St. John have been pressing to have some of the troops landed at that port, and Hon. A. G. Blair has striven to carry out their wishes. It was in response to his representations that the militia depart-

ment took action. Another Ottawa dispatch says: Some curiosity is expressed as to the whereabouts of the Canadian Postal Corps. under Capt. Ecclestone, in South Africa, as nothing has been heard from them recently. It is stated in some quarters that the corps is on its back with Col. Otter's command, but this is not believed at the postoffice department. The officials here think that the corps will not return until it has been notified by the imperial authorities that its services are no longer required.

GUNNER PRICE. Brockville, Ont., Dec. 13. - Gunner Price, a Brockville boy, returned last night from the South African war. He was given a royal welcome at the station by the 41st Battalion, the cadets, and an immense crowd. He was escorted to Victoria Hall, amid a great display of fireworks. Speeches of welcome were made, and the greatest enthusiasm prevailed. He was afterwards taken to the club house, where a blanquet had been prepared in his honor. Gunner Price participated in many of the most important engagements of the war, and after Mafeking siege was invalided home, He appears none the worse for his
