mond, Quebec.Sir Charles Tupper, Lady Tupper
and Miss Tupper have arrived at Win-
nipeg from Vancouver, on their way
to England.The lumbermen in the Ottawa valley
have entered the woods to commence
the fall cut, and men are being hired
in all directions.Two thousand five hundred harvest-
ers reached Winnipeg from Ontario on
Saturday, and 1,000 were sent to
Moosejaw at midnight.Canadian railways have been sum-
moned to appear before the inter-
commerce commission on a charge of
carrying hay and straw into the United
States at too low rates.Ecuador's handsome building at the
Pan-American Exposition was formally
transferred to the exposition com-
pany today, the anniversary of the
birth of that republic.A bylaw exempting the Sun Port-
land Cement Company from taxation for
ten years, excepting for schools, was
carried at Owen Sound Saturday—
790 votes for and 15 against.The carload of horses brought to
Windsor from New Mexico was sold
by auction. The animals were all
mares and found a ready sale among
the farmers. The prices ranged from
\$39 to \$70 each.United States Senator Dewey, now
in London, says he is going to retire
from the interviewing business. He
says he has generally enjoyed it dur-
ing the last quarter of a century, but
has so often been misquoted that he
has decided to quit.Immense quantities of herring are
being taken on the New Brunswick
coast. The sardine factories need help
to handle the fish. Five hundred men,
women and children are guaranteed
work there for several weeks at good
wages.Rev. Lacombe, organizer of Catholic
missions in the Northwest, is in Mon-
treal, and says that although the crops
will be unusually large in Manitoba
they will be poor in parts of the North
west, and perhaps ruined in sections of

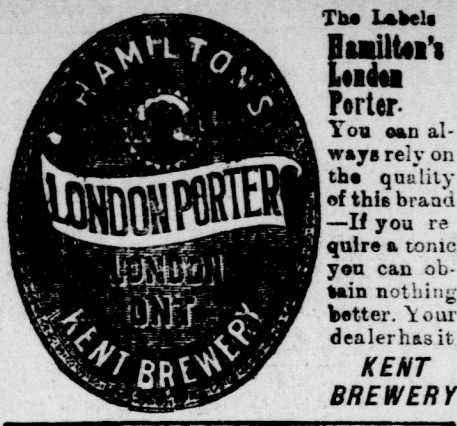

ginning her address, Miss Alway made
a brief reference to the Mission Train-
ing School with which she is connect-

whole-hearted Christian woman, Mrs.
Osborne, was impressed with the ne-
cessity for such a school, and began
the work herself with one pupil. This
pupil has been for a number of years
a most successful missionary, and in
the meantime one hundred persons
have received their training in the
school, and are now filling honored
positions as missionaries in various
