

STRONGEST FLEET FOR HOME WATERS

Significant Changes Being Introduced Into the British Naval Organization.

London, Dec. 11.—Naval changes are being quickly introduced under the new rule of Sir John Fisher, the first sea lord. Hitherto every new battleship, on hoisting a pennant for the first time, has been hurried to the Mediterranean and older ships have been recalled. For more than a decade the Mediterranean has been Britain's newest as well as largest fleet. Now the policy is to be changed, the center of tactical control is to be brought nearer to English shores. The home fleet will hold the premier position, and it is anticipated that the channel fleet shall be the most formidable force afloat. A sign of this development, and that when Rear Admiral May takes over the command of the channel fleet from Lord Charles Hareford at the new year, the magnificent new battleship King Edward VII. will be his flagship. Until a few weeks ago it was understood that the King Edward VII. was to go to the Mediterranean. This ship and the successors of her class which are to be constructed will constitute the channel fleet of the future.

The remarkable efficiency of the King Edward is not generally known. All that has been divulged about the recent horse-power trials was that they were satisfactory, which was understood to mean that the contract speed of 18.5 knots had been fulfilled. As a matter of fact, the battleship achieved a more notable performance. For more than five hours she maintained 19.9 knots an hour, while at one period of the run she registered 25 knots. The mean average of 8 hours was 19.5 knots. The King Edward VII. is therefore a full knot faster than contract speed. The admiralty considers they now possess probably the fastest battleship in the world.

The admiralty has issued a circular to all naval commanders explaining Lord Selbourne's scheme, which is to be effective on Jan. 1, and detailing the organization of warships of the reserve. Each ship on the war line not in commission at sea will be kept commissioned in the reserve, and have a nucleus crew comprising all the important officers and two-fifths of the crew. The ships will be kept in port, and will be distributed between home ports, and will be available for surplus crews in barracks to enable six battleships of first-class cruisers to be fully commissioned on emergency without dislocating the general mobilization arrangement.

THIRTEEN HOURS PRAYER

Strange Manifestations at Religious Revival in Wales.

London, Dec. 12.—The religious revival in Wales is producing strange manifestations. Finding that prolonged prayer meetings do not agree with their business, men are giving up their occupations and women are neglecting their household duties.

One of the leaders in the district of Rhos, near Ruabon, got so exuberant at a meeting that it took six strong men to pacify him. He insisted that a spirit had him crown Christ.

Prayer meetings have lasted as long as thirteen hours without intervals for meals or refreshments, and frequently three men commence praying simultaneously. To the utter bewilderment of a congregation once deacon proceeding to read a certain portion of the Scripture forgot the place, and was so carried away by his feelings that he started singing a Welsh congregational hymn, all joining heartily.

At Penrhos, South Wales, people are so stirred by the Evan Roberts' crusade that they stay in the streets singing hymns till 5 in the morning. Converts number scores daily.

Deadlock in Austrian House

Vienna, Dec. 10.—Another parliamentary deadlock has arisen through the German Radicals joining the Czechs and Southern Slavs in opposing the Government's scheme to obtain parliamentary consent to a loan of \$14,000,000 for treasury purposes. The budget committee has rejected the scheme and the Premier has to promulgate the Reichsrath.

The cabinet may resign. Premier von Koerber is expected to do so in any event.

IMPERIAL DEFENSE AND THE COLONIES

Neither Bluster Nor Coaxing Likely to Have Any Good Effect.

London, Dec. 12.—The Liverpool Daily Post and Mercury says: Mr. Balfour regarded the Colonial reputation that the colonies were "our children." While Chamberlain is pursuing the fiscal campaign we are not likely to be allowed to forget that relationship. We have also to remember that the colonies have very strong objections to being treated as children, and that they are claiming all the rights of mature states. Why should South Africa or Australia be expected to give a voluntary contribution if Canada does not? And why should Canada contribute to a defense fund in the expenditure of which she has no voice?

The Manchester Guardian says the colonies may give sums from time to time as an eleemosynary grant, but a demand for right is in their opinion an infractio of colonial independence, and a withdrawal of rights we have given them in the past. From this position no amount of coaxing or bluster is likely to induce the colonies to depart.

The London Globe says the solution of the imperial defense can only be found in that of imperial federation. The Westminster Gazette, on imperial defense, says the contribution of Canada in proportion to population would be £3,500,000, the contribution of Australia and New Zealand, £3,150,000. There is, of course, no prospect that these sums or anything like them will be forthcoming. We must be grateful for what we can get, remembering that any gift to the empire must be voluntary and unconditional.

The Pall Mall Gazette says: In the colonies there is still much room for a broader knowledge of the principles of imperial defense and naval protection of the empire which concern the whole empire and every constituent thereof.

REGARDING RAILWAY RATES

Commission at Ottawa Gives Out Its Official Statement.

Ottawa, Dec. 12.—The railway commission has issued the following statement regarding rates.

The railway commission has not approved or authorized any increase in the passenger tolls of any of the railways, and has no power to authorize the continuance by the railways of their present maximum tolls and the publication in the Canada Gazette, as required by the new railway act. These maximum tolls were ordered by the board to be published by Dec. 31 inst., failing which publication the railways, under the act, could not legally collect any tolls whatever. The maximum tolls are referred to in the act as the standard passenger tariffs, and these were approved by the Governor-in-Council when they were first promulgated. The working tariff referred to in the act as the special passenger tariff has not been changed. This tariff represents the reduced rates, brought about by competition, or other causes, which are usually charged by railways. The act does not require the publication of these rates in the Canada Gazette, but they cannot be advanced without notice to the commission, which has the power to disallow any such advance. Should investigation show that the maximum or any tolls approved by the board are excessive, the board has the power to rescind, change or vary its approval at any time or on application.

DOWIE'S DUPES

Paid the Last Installment of Zion City's Big Debt.

Chicago, Dec. 12.—Zion City has paid the final installment on its big debt. Checks were sent out yesterday in payment of the final 40 per cent, approximately \$140,000, of the original indebtedness of more than \$400,000.

One year ago a number of creditors of Zion City petitioned Judge Kohlsaat for the appointment of receivers for Zion, whose affairs then were gloomy. Mrs. Dowie was in Europe, and reports had it that she had carried away with her the sums of money. Judge Kohlsaat was preparing for departure on Jan. 1 for Australia and the creditors numbered 1,100, and the aggregate amount of their claims footed up \$435,000. Judge Kohlsaat appointed receivers, who took charge of Zion's affairs, and he could pay the debt in a year if the receivers were removed. Then came the appointment of a committee of creditors, who concluded that Dowie was better fitted to conduct Zion than any other person. It was arranged that he was to pay 10 per cent in three months, 25 per cent in six months, and 25 per cent in nine months, and the balance of 40 per cent in a year. The receivers were discharged. Dowie has paid 100 cents on the dollar on every claim involved.

Ferryboat Crushed by Ice.

Bellaire, Ohio, Dec. 12.—The ferryboat "A. A. Dineen" crossing to Bellaire with 40 passengers was crushed by floating ice and sank in the middle of the Ohio River. The passengers crawled out on the ice and were nearly dead from exposure when rescued.

Foundry Dynamited.

Cincinnati, Ohio, Dec. 12.—For the fifth time within two months the New Iron Foundry and Machine Company's building, Newport, Ky., was dynamited Sunday night. No one was injured. Two men were seen running east in Twelfth street immediately after the explosion, but they eluded their pursuers. A great hole was torn in the roof of the coal room where the dynamite was exploded, and the pattern room was so twisted and bulged that it is feared they will collapse. Members of the company declare it is the work of strikers.

Cross-Petition in North Wentworth.

Toronto, Dec. 12.—A cross-petition was filed yesterday morning on behalf of E. D. Smith, the Conservative candidate in Wentworth at the Dominion elections, against W. C. Sealey, who has protested the return of Smith on a scrutiny. Besides the usual charges of bribery, treating, etc., against the candidate and his agents, it is claimed that a number of ballots were marked so that they could be identified, and that there were ballot papers marked for Sealey before they were given to the voters.

Alfred H. Marshall, of Hudson,

has received 100 honey bees and a queen bee from Italy by mail. Just 18 out of the 100 were dead when they arrived in Hudson, and the others are apparently strong and rugged and ready to get to work.

CREED CRITICISM BY REV. CARTER

Claims He Should Not Be Tried for Heresy—Action of Presbytery.

New York, Dec. 12.—Rev. Dr. Samuel L. Carter, one of the three Presbyterian abeyermen who started the movement which led to the revision of the Presbyterian creed in America, today was upheld by the Nassau County Presbytery at a meeting in Jamaica, L. I., after he had appeared in defense of a letter he wrote against the Westminster confession, in which he declared that "scholastic theology is wrong from its base upwards." Last September he addressed a letter to the Presbytery of Nassau, of which he is the oldest member, renouncing certain long established teachings of Presbyterianism, including the "fall of man." At the next meeting of the Presbytery of Nassau a committee was appointed to ask Dr. Carter if he did not know of some way to avoid a trial for heresy. The minister insisted upon pleading his cause with the Presbytery personally. In doing so today Dr. Carter said: "The great objection to the confession is not this statement in it or that, but it is the whole tone and style of the confession. To put the matter in a word—it is a trial for heresy. Westminster Confession that is wrong. One Presbyter unfortunately suggested that the love of God should be put in a footnote to the confession. It is better to have the love of God in a footnote than not to have it at all. Every minister and elder upon entering his office must accept the Westminster Confession as being the system of doctrine taught in the Scriptures, and every scoter can still value this system against the Presbyterian Church. I am convinced there can be no rest nor peace till this system is fully abandoned by the church as it is by the brief statement, 'If Calvin were living today he would be chairman of the revision committee. I think the Presbytery of Nassau is quite as much on trial as I am before the people and the same thing can be said of the church in general. There is no such God as the God of the Westminster Confession. It is all rash, exaggerated and bitterly untrue. If one else is ready to say it, I say it. The hard, cold, severe God of the Westminster Confession, with the love left out, is not our God.'

Dr. Carter entered into a defense of his letter to the Presbytery, in which he had said that "scholastic theology is wrong from its base upwards," and went into some details of the arguments. Dr. Carter closed by saying: "I do not condemn; do not cast me out of my ministry; welcome me again to the pulpit; give me some of the beautiful understanding that there shall be greater theological freedom in the Presbyterian Church than has been allowed heretofore."

A resolution was adopted, laying over the letter of Dr. Carter on the table, "in favor of the Presbyterian emphasis of the brief statement of the present vital creed of the Presbyterian Church, and that this Presbytery request our brother to continue his honored connection with the Presbyterian communion."

MRS. CHADWICK'S TROUBLES GROW

Twice Indicted on Charges of Forgery—Implicit Trust of Her Friend Reynolds.

Cleveland, Ohio, Dec. 12.—Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick was twice indicted yesterday by the grand jury of Cuyahoga county. Her friend, Mr. Reynolds, treasurer and secretary of the Western Park Bank, gave evidence that she believed his trust was justified. Only one other witness was called to the stand. Mrs. Chadwick was released on bail of \$500,000, which was payable at the National Bank of Commerce in New York. Under each indictment are two counts, one charging forgery, the other uttering of forged papers. Information of the indictments was once wired to New York by county Prosecutor Keeler, who requested that Mrs. Chadwick be immediately rearrested if she secured bail on the other charges.

The examination of Mr. Reynolds failed to disclose any asset that might be recovered by Mrs. Chadwick. He said she was the illegitimate daughter of Andrew Carnegie. "Later, Mr. Reynolds, in detailing his transactions with Mrs. Chadwick, he said: 'I believe her from what she told me that Andrew Carnegie was backing her. He then added: "And I have not had anything yet to make me doubt it."

Regarding the \$5,000,000 note bearing the name of Andrew Carnegie he said: "Mrs. Chadwick called me to her house. I think it was March 5, 1902, and said she wished to intrust to me some securities. She said she had been advised to place them in the possession of a third party, and she wanted me to take care of them."

Continuing the witness said: "She then handed me a paper to sign, as near as I can remember, it read: 'I certify that I hold in trust for Mrs. Cassie L. Chadwick securities and a note for \$5,000,000, which she has indorsed, but he had no doubt that the alleged maker of the note was back of the woman.'

Carnegie Subpoenaed.

New York, Dec. 12.—A subpoena was served on Andrew Carnegie at his home in this city yesterday, calling upon him to go to Cleveland, Ohio, and testify in the case of Mrs. Chadwick.

It is said that the entire fabric of John D. Rockefeller's enormous fortune rests upon a loan of \$5,000 which was made to him many years ago by L. V. Harkness, a liquor dealer, of Cleveland. The transaction occurred at a time when Rockefeller and his associates in the oil business were face to face with disaster.

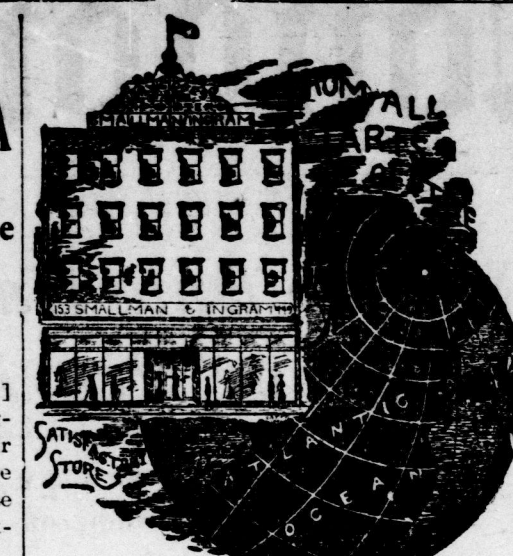
