### **EVELYN SETTLES**

Mrs. Harry Thaw Pays \$250 For Her Contempt of Court.

New York, May 7.—Evelyn Nesbift Thaw did not go to Ludlow street jail today, instead paying the fine \$250 imposed upon her by Justice McAver for contempt in failure to appear in supplementary proceedings.

According to the court's order, this sum is to be applied to the extinction of the judgment for \$253, secured by Elise A. Hartwig, a milliner, upon which the proceedings for supplementary proceedings were taken.

There still remains to be paid a sum of nearly \$100, made up of costs in various courts, before Mrs. Thaw can have her affairs taken out of the hands of the receiver. Unless she pays these amounts, attorneys for Mrs. Thaw's creditors stated today, further actions will be taken and she will again be called in supplementary proceedings.

### WEATHER FEATURES IN FICKLE APRIL

Low Temperatures All Over the Country—Vegetation Is Much Delayed.

Meteorological Office, Toronto, May 6.—The temperature over the Dominion during April was below the average, except in portions of Prince Ed-ward Island and Cape Breton, where the average was somewhat exceeded. The negative departures were marked especially so in the western provinces, where they ranged from 9 to 12 degrees. The northern portions of British Columbia, Ontario and Quebec also recorded as much as 7 and 8 degrees "But you said we might go,' I per- with an absorption which precluded the perature reported to this office was at Agassiz, B. Precipitation.

In British Columbia the precipitation was much below the average amount, except in Cariboo, where there was more than usual. Calgary recorded 100 per cent above the average, while Battleford experienced 100 per cent below the average quantity. In Manitoba the excess throughout the province ranged from 31 to about 50 per cent. Elsewhere in the Dominion the precipitation was largely above the average, except in the eastern portion of Quebec, and in parts of Prince Edward Island and Cape Breton, where the deficiency was rather marked. In the Province of Ontario the positive departure was generally from two to four inches. Snow fell at intervals, the usual April snowfall record in the several provinces being as a rule much

General Notes.

British Columbia.-The weather April was cool throughout the whole month, and vegetation in most parts of the province is probably two or three weeks later than usual; general conditions for agriculture have been favorable, and seeding is well advanced; fruit trees of all kinds are blooming at Victoria, and the prospects are good for pear, plum and cherry crops. Rain is wanted in nearly all districts; light frosts prevailed in coast districts during the latter part of the month, but tender vegetation was not sufficiently advanced to suffer to any extent.

Western Provinces .- The weather of the month was unusually cold backward. No growth was noticeable, and very little seeding was accom-Quebec .- April weather was unusu-

ally cold and wintry in all portions of the province, precipitation being very light in the eastern half and fairly heavy elsewhere. New Brunswick.

was a marked deficiency of warm springlike days. Nova Scotia. - A cold, backward month generally, with rain on eleven days and snow on nine, over eight

inches of snow being recorded on the 26th of the month. Prince Edward Island.-The weather the greater part of April was cold and wet, less forward for the season than previous months.

In Ontario.

The weather of April was unusually cold throughout the Province, and the precipitation greatly exceeded the normal. Snow fell at frequent intervals during the month, the storm of the 30th being especially severe. Conditions gererally were very unfavorable for

Port Arthur-Bay clear of ice, though rivers and streams only open near mouths. Inland lakes not open, many of them covered with snow and ice, Snow still deep in the woods. No signs of vegetation.

London-Season very backward, Severe storm on the 29th, accompanied by hail, thunder and lightning. Gravenhurst-Gulls and robing were numerous on the 2nd, cranes the 3rd wild geese and loons on the 11th; willows budding on the 16th, alder

bloom on the 22nd; ice all gone off Muskoka Lake on the 27th. Renfrew-An unusually large number of birds arrived during April, The farmers commenced plowing about the 26th; soft maples out in flower on the 30th

Beatrice-Season very backward; nothing done towards cultivation of

Lansdowne-First robin seen on the 5th; frogs piping on the 12th; plowing on the 15th; first seeding done on the

Barrie-General arrival of spring birds on the 1st; ice breaking up on the 27th; bay clear of ice on the 19th; spring plowing and seeding very back-Clinton-Fall wheat has suffered

slightly from late frosts; crocuses, spring beauties and hepaticas in bloom on the 15th; thunderstorms on the 7th, 18th and 29th; streams dull, and low lands flooded on the 30th; scarcely any seeding done at the end of the

Georgetown-Unseasonably cold conditions, with strong winds, marked the weather of the month; butterflies seen on the 4th; kildeer on the 5th; vesper sparrow on the 6th; crocus in bloom on the 8th; hepaticas on the 9th; frost out of ground on the 17th; some seed ing done on the 26th. All vegetation backward.

Port Burwell-Season very backward and not much seeding done. Strathroy—April weather was un-usually cold and backward. Heavy snowsterm on the 30th, accompanied by thunder and lightning; farm work well under way.




