LEAGUE THIS YEAR

Doo Sheppard Announces That Suitable
Grounds Cannot Be Secured
in Toronto.

Service.] Hamilton, April 4.—The local promoters of the Inter-City Baseball League, which was to have comprised teams from Toronto, Hamilton, Brantford and Niagara Falls, received a letter today from "Doc" Sheppard, stating that it would be impossible to secure Diamond Park for the Toronto grounds, as there was a clause in the purchase agreement against any baseball game there without the consent of the Toronto baseball club. DE PALMA DRIVES FAST

Sets 0:36 1-5 in Auto at Los Angeles
—Oldfield Tests Track.

AVIATOR DROPPED
INTO FRISCO BAY

Frank Johnson Has Thrilling Experience
During Exhibition Flight.

[Associated Press.] Alameda, Cal., April 5.—Plunging from a height of 20 feet into the waters of San Francisco Bay, Frank Johnson, an aviator, riding his Curtiss bi-plane, was nearly drowned yesterday, a mile off shore. For several minutes it seemed that the aviator was lost, and his mother and wife, who witnessed the accident, fainted. After the machine settled in the bay, Johnson could be seen by several hundred spectators swimming toward shallow water. Two men in a skiff rescued him.

The machine was recovered and towed ashore.

Johnson explained that one of the planes failed to respond as he was about to make a sharp turn. The accident occurred while he was making the twelfth flight of the afternoon before a large crowd.

CAN'T DISCRIMINATE

Western Union Not Aware of Illegal "Bucketing" Over Its Wires.

New York, April 5.—Intimations from Washington that the Federal Government is keenly interested in the leased wire contracts, under which some of the companies indicted in Washington for running bucket shops are said to pay the Western Union Telegraph Company \$100,000 a year, each, brought forth a statement from Belvedere Brooks, vice-president of the American Telegraph and Telephone Company, and the new general manager of the Western Union.

Mr. Brooks said: "Telegraph companies are required to render service to the public without discrimination, and cannot and should not be permitted to inquire into the character of the message or its purpose. It is utterly impracticable for a telegraph company to investigate the business affairs of persons dealing with it, and it is under no duty to make such investigation. In most of the States this right of the public to have its business transmitted is provided for by severe statutory enactments, neither the courts nor the public would, for an instant, permit a telegraph company to act as censor."

Some yet—ago the Western Union abandoned its telegraph service to poolrooms under the compulsion of public sentiment and the betting laws.

PINKERTON USHERS AT
JEFF JOHNSON FIGHT

Promoters Will Maintain Order at Any
Cost—All Weapons Will Be
Barred.

[Associated Press.] New York, April 4.—There's going to be absolute order at the Jeff-Johnson championship mill on July 4, and Jack Gleason, who is here perfecting some of the arrangements, is going to employ Pinkerton detectives as ushers. Gleason says they will wear uniforms, and besides seating the spectators, will take care of the noisy ones.

Gleason has formulated some interesting rules for spectators. No one will be allowed to enter with a weapon of any sort, though Gleason did not say today whether each spectator would be "frisked" to see if he carried a gun.

A plan is being considered to float a captive balloon over the ring and have the number of each round shown by a big placard that drops down.

WAR CLOUD HOVERS
ABOVE THE ANDES

Looks Now as if Ecuador and
Peru Would Come to
Blows.

Lima, Peru, April 5.—Aroused by the conduct of the Ecuador crowds in attacking the Peruvian embassy at Guayaquil, 5,000 young men of this territory and after passing the principal thoroughfares proceeded to the Ecuadorian consulate, where they removed the coat-of-arms from above the plaza in front of the building, which they called upon the president for a speech. Responding, he expressed the hope that the enthusiasm of the young men would be turned to facts in case of the country's need.

Later the cabinet council determined to demand immediate and full satisfaction from Ecuador. It was stated that if this scope of action was refused, would at once advance to the frontier and a fleet of warships would be sent to block the harbor of Guayaquil. The Government has called out the reserves.

SAM FITZPATRICK
PICKS JEFF TO WIN

Jack Johnson's Former Manager
Says Negro Hasn't the
Punch.

JEFFRIES IS CONFIDENT

Smiles Approval When Berger Predicts He Will Win in Ten Rounds.

[Special to The Advertiser.] San Francisco, April 4.—Sam Fitzpatrick, former manager of Jack Johnson, and the man who attended to the negro's affairs during the Australian trip when the championship was won by Johnson from Tommy Burns, stated last night that he believed Jeffries would be returned the winner in the fight at Emeryville on July 4.

"I am not under-estimating Johnson's gameness, nor am I failing to take into account his ability as a cleverest fighter of the heavyweight division, but when I say that Johnson cannot win over Jeffries, I mean it. Jack Johnson hasn't the punch that will put Jeffries to sleep, and that is the whole story. He couldn't knock Jeffries off his feet if they fought a hundred rounds. I know both the men and particularly I know Johnson."

BERGER SAYS JEFFRIES
WILL WIN IN TEN ROUNDS

Manager of Boilemaker Predicts His
Man Will Have an Easy Time
With Johnson.

[By Associated Press.] Oakland, Cal., April 4.—Expressing entire confidence in his ability to get into physical shape for a long distance fight with Jack Johnson, the star of the Santa Cruz Mountains, J. J. Jeffries arrived from Los Angeles today en route to his training quarters for the Santa Cruz Mountains.

He will go to his camp tomorrow, accompanied by his manager, Sam Berger, and the usual retinue of rubbers, and trainers.

Berger said today in Jeffries' hearing that they expected to win from Johnson in ten rounds or less, and the fighter smiled approval of the statement, though he said nothing.
