JOHN ITTER OF PORT ELGIN IS HEAT VICTIM
Stricken While Visiting With His Daughter in Toronto.
TORONTO, July 3.—The first death attributed to the excessive heat occurred today, when John Itter of Port Elgin, Ont., succumbed. He was visiting his daughter here.
SEES NO RELIEF.
TORONTO, July 3.—The weatherman sees no immediate prospect of relief from the heat wave which has centered over Ontario and Western Quebec for several days. The program is "fair and very warm" for Monday. The high temperature, however, seems to be moving eastward and relief may come on Tuesday. Since Saturday rain has fallen over the western provinces.
The heat has not been oppressive over the Maritime Provinces, while Ontario has been sweltering, but they are promised fair and warm weather for Monday. Manitoba will be comparatively cool on Monday with some showers. Saskatchewan will see the tail end of the rain clouds, while Alberta will feel the temperature rising again tomorrow.
RAIN IN ALBERTA.
CALGARY, July 3.—Rain has been quite general in Alberta during the last 24 hours with the benefit to crops, inestimable, the moisture coming when urgently needed in some places, according to the Calgary Herald.
Lethbridge, Medicine Hat, Red Deer, Oids, Bassano, Munson, Coronation, Lacombe, Wetaskiwin, McLeod, Camrose, Edmonton and other districts all report rain, and, of course, the Calgary section fared splendidly Friday afternoon and during the night. Saturday morning the Canadian Pacific Railway reports state that over its Lethbridge division rain was general, and the precipitation was continuing at the time of wiring in the McLeod area.

CLARK URGES TARIFF REFORM AS BEST POLICY
Outlines Platform of Progressives At Guelph Meeting.
WOULD REMOVE DUTIES
Wants Cheaper Agricultural Implements and Boots and Shoes.
[Special to The Advertiser.]
GUELPH, July 3.—Dr. Michael Clark, M.P., Red Deer, and J. J. Morrison, secretary of the U. F. O., were the speakers at the U. F. O. and the L. P. D. in the city hall. The weather was so hot that everybody removed their coats. The meeting was largely attended, nearly 500 being present. The chair was occupied by J. R. Watson, president of the South Wellington Farmers' Club, and seated on the platform were: A. Cockburn, the defeated candidate at the last provincial elections; Thomas J. Mahon, secretary of the South Wellington Farmers' Club; Mr. Clark, Elora; J. A. Mackay, president of the U. F. O.; G. A. Penfold, and G. A. Fowke of the local labor organization.
Appeals to Farmers.
Mr. Morrison, the first speaker, contented himself with an enunciation of the principles of the U. F. O., what it stood for socially, industrially and politically. He urged the farmers to take a greater interest in the affairs of the country, and stated that the time had come when they were going to assert themselves, and have a say in the affairs of the state.
Dr. Clark delivered an address which lasted for an hour. It was essentially a free trade speech from first to last. He advocated the removal of the duty on agricultural implements, boots and shoes and other commodities, and said that all industries should be able to stand on their own feet and not seek the assistance of governments.
He declared that only under the progressive policy which had been adopted by the Progressive party could Canada hope to get rid of her national debt, and that the sooner the nations of the world adopted a system of free trade and removed all trade obstacles the better it would be for all of them. He was given a good hearing from start to finish, and his address was frequently punctuated by applause.

LONDON WOMAN IS HONORED FOR HER GOOD WORK
Medal of Recognition Presented to Mrs. Allen McLean.
TORONTO, July 2.—Much of the interest in the delightfully informal reception tendered the members of the French Mission at Government House yesterday centred in the presentation by Marshal Fayolle, head of the mission of "medals of recognition" for service to France through the Secours National and other organizations.
The first to be called upon to have a "Medaille de la Reconnaissance" pinned on was Alderman Mrs. Sidney Small. Others thus honored with recognition were Mrs. W. W. Beardmore, Lady Falconbridge, Mrs. Philip Gilbert, Mrs. W. R. Johnston, Mrs. Wells of Toronto, and Mrs. Allen McLean, London, and Mrs. Hugh McLeod, St. Catharines.
The mischievous spirit of a distinguished Canadian soldier, with a dazzling array of decorations, including the Legion of Honor, was doubtless responsible for an amusing little incident which occurred as the last of the honorees were leaving the Government House.
"When you present the Legion of Honor, you kiss the one receiving the decoration on either cheek. Why not kiss the ladies when you bestow decorations on them?" teased the Canadian high-up officer. Apparently the idea appealed to the French marshal. As he was about to step into the waiting automobile he turned for a last word with a little group, in the centre of which stood Alderman Mrs. Sidney Small. Taking from his breast with his left hand his gorgeous marshal's cap, he bowed his right hand to the charming woman member of Toronto's city council, at the same time claiming in a practical way the privilege of the French official in pinning on the Legion of Honor.

TORNADO LOSS IS \$100,000
Every Building in Town of Aberdeen Damaged in Big Blow.
ABERDEEN, S. D., July 3.—A tornado struck Frederick, South Dakota, last night, killing one man and causing over \$100,000 damage. Practically every building in the town was demolished.
Arne Anderson, who was assisting his family to the basement of their home, was killed in his effort to escape when the house was torn from its foundation.

TWO DIE WHEN TRAIN CRASHES INTO AUTOMOBILE
Third Person Seriously Hurt in Accident Near Dunnville.
DUNNVILLE, July 3.—Two persons were killed and a third seriously injured this afternoon, when a party of six in an automobile were struck by a Grand Trunk train at the Inman crossing about four miles east of Dunnville. Mrs. George Miles and Daniel Deacon of Moulton Township died a few minutes after the accident through injuries received, and Fred Brunt, a boy of nine years of age, sustained a fractured skull and other serious injuries.
Mr. and Mrs. Frank Brunt and Mr. Smith were injured, but not seriously.

SPEEDER KILLS CHATHAM MAN
Frank Tinney Run Down by Auto in Detroit.
[Special to The Advertiser.]
DETROIT, July 3.—Frank Tinney, aged 37, of Chatham, Ont., died in Harper Hospital this afternoon from injuries received when he was struck by an auto at Jefferson avenue and Beaubien street last night.
Members of Tinney's family said today that as they crossed Jefferson avenue two machines, going at a high rate of speed, approached. Tinney dodged the first, but was struck to the pavement by the second. His skull was fractured.
Neither of the machines stopped after the killing, and police of the accident bureau are investigating. Tinney's body will be removed to the home of his parents from the county morgue.

HYDRO SURPLUS IS \$3,000,000
Statement Shows Reserve Fund of Almost Eleven Millions.
TORONTO, July 3.—A surplus of nearly \$3,000,000 and reserve totaling nearly \$11,000,000 are showing in the financial statement of the Ontario Hydro-Electric Power Commission of Ontario in the Niagara system for the period ending December 31, 1920. The Niagara system embraces 167 municipalities, rural districts and companies. The statement shows total assets of \$72,652,213.70, liabilities of \$59,362,017.20, and total reserves of \$13,290,196.50. During the period 1913-1920, co-partners in the undertaking have been remunerated of approximately \$8,000,000 through the medium of rate reduction. For the year 1920 a revenue of \$8,542,204.27 was received from the hydro customers of the Niagara system, and the total cost of supplying the service was \$7,890,585.33, leaving a surplus for the year of \$651,718.94. A sinking fund is being provided to liquidate the funded debt and rebuild the whole plant in 25 or 30 years.

DEATH OF MRS. MIDDLETON.
FOREST, July 2.—Mrs. Laurel Middleton, wife of G. T. R. Agent William Middleton, died at her home here today following a week's illness. With her husband she came here thirteen years ago from Tara, Ont., and was a very active member of the Presbyterian Church. The funeral will be held on Monday afternoon to Beechwood Cemetery.

TWO KILLED AS AUTO CRASHES INTO BIG TREE
Car Got Out of Control While Going Down Hill.
HAMILTON, Ont., July 3.—Two members of a Toronto motoring party, Mrs. Thomas Gamble, 37, and Alfred Pardon, 60, were killed and several others were injured this afternoon when their Chalmers car got out of control in descending Fifty Mountain at Windsor. The accident occurred at the detour of the Hamilton-Niagara Falls road, where the provincial government is making improvements. It is said that several complaints have been lodged recently about the dangerous condition of this piece of road. Sydney Gallagher, the driver of the car had sold the machine to Mr. Gamble only a few days ago.
When half way down the hill the car began to speed up and the driver apparently lost control for it struck a tree. This checked the speed, but only for an instant. The grade was steep and the car dashed ahead again, crashing into another tree, turned over and pinned down the two whose lives were crushed out.
Mrs. Pardon and Charles Baker jumped out when the first tree was struck, and they escaped with minor injuries. Mrs. Gamble and Mr. Pardon died soon after being removed from the wreck. The other injured ones were moved to Hamilton Hospital. The extent of their injuries is not fully known.

SUNDAY BATHING IS ALLOWED AT SARNIA BEACHES
Summer Resorters Much Interested in Port Stanley Case.

SARNIA, July 3.—Sunday bathing was allowed at the local beaches today and according to a statement made by Crown Attorney Wilson it is unlikely that any action will be taken here to prohibit local residents from taking their Sabbath dip in the lake.
Speaking of the attempt to prohibit Sunday bathing, Crown Attorney Wilson stated that the effort was all news to him.
"As far as I am concerned I never heard of such a proposition," he said. "Crown Attorney Wilson's stand is favored by popular sentiment here as hundreds of beach residents and bathers announced that if they were not allowed to bathe on hot Sundays on the Canadian side of the border they would simply take the ferry and bathe in the lake on the American side."
Lord Day Alliance officials here were non-committal on the issue, but considerable interest is being taken here in the situation at Port Stanley.

GRAND MASTER TO LAY STONE OF NEW TEMPLE
Big Masonic Gathering To Be Held At Windsor On Saturday.
WINDSOR, July 3.—John Fry, secretary of the Great Western Lodge, has been notified that the Grand Lodge of Masons will meet in Windsor on Saturday, July 3, for the purpose of assisting Grand Master F. W. Harcourt, J. C. of Toronto in the laying of the corner-stone of the new Masonic Temple.
In Windsor last month building permits issued numbered 108, and the estimated value of the buildings represented was \$1,442,750. In June there were 100 permits issued, and the value was \$342,220.
Made Big Jump.
The difference is accounted for by the permit for the new ten-story hotel being erected at the corner of Park street and Ouellette street by the Border Cities Hotel Company. The estimated value of the building is \$1,215,000.
Vital statistics for June are: Births, 129; marriages, 25; deaths, 49. A popular feature of the record for the past six months is disclosed in the births returns, which stood at 129 for April, May and June, and at 108 for January, February and March.

WOODSTOCK, July 2.—J. A. Brown, a local truck driver, had a miraculous escape from death today when he was driving west on Dundas street, and had reached the middle of the G. T. R. track when the St. Thomas passenger train crashed into him. Brown was thrown clear of the wreckage. He suffered a broken leg, a fractured arm and severe scalp and other wounds. He has a good chance for recovery.

SERIOUS CHARGES TO BE INVESTIGATED
Brutal Treatment of Prisoners in Toronto Jail Alleged.
TORONTO, July 2.—Two affidavits regarding the conduct of guards at the Toronto jail have been filed with Mayor Church. One tells of circumstances surrounding the alleged striking of the prisoner Cunningham, who later succumbed, and the other tells of the construction of a whipping machine, and of prisoners becoming intoxicated on cider manufactured at the farm.
Patrick Kilty, in his statement, says that he and another prisoner named Cowan heard screams coming from Cunningham's cell on the night of May 15, after seeing guards Reed and Ross enter. He then heard Reed demand an apology for some remarks that had been made to Ross. They had heard Cunningham reply: "I apologize, Mr. Reed. Don't strike me again. And this is what you do to a returned man with only one arm!"
Mayor Church has demanded an investigation.
