In other words, when it comes to picking up signs out of the air, the Marconi system has nothing on Murphy. All of which means that Danny Murphy is of invaluable aid to the batters on the Philadelphia Club, by being able to tell them in advance what the opposing pitcher intends to throw.

Don't get the impression there is anything unsportsmanilke about Murphy's methods, for such is not the case. Murphy doesn't use any field glasses or employ any other outside help to gather his information, other than a keen sense of observation and the ability to think quickly.

To me Danny Murphy is one of the most remarkable characters in baseball. Standing on the third base coaching lines when the Athletics are at bat, he is far from an imposing figure. His position is usually a careless one, and he emits no wild yells like Hughey Jennings did in the days of old.
