COMMONS PROROGUED WITH LIBERAL CAMPAIGN PLEDGES FULFILLED BY PREMIER KING

Deadlock Between Houses Delays Formal Termination of Session As Managers Confer When Commons Declines To Accept Senate Amendments To Two Bills.

FORGET PARTY DIFFERENCES AS MEMBERS WAGE PAPER BATTLE ROYAL IN LAST HOURS OF SESSION

Meighen Fails in Effort To Block Bill Respecting Department of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment—House Concurs in Senate Amendments To Indian Act.

HOUSE OF COMMONS, Ottawa, June 27.—A momentous session in the House of Commons, marked by the determination of Premier W. L. Mackenzie King and other Liberal leaders to fulfill to the letter the pledges made the electorate which restored the party to power last December, came to an end tonight, with the goal so hard fought for by the government attained, when parliament was prorogued to meet again in January.

Differences between the two Houses delayed prorogation beyond the determined time of 9:30.

The Senate had amended a couple of bills and the Commons declined to accept the Senate amendments. The Senate insisted on its viewpoint. Hence a deadlock, the appointment of managers by each House to confer—and delay in formal termination of the session.

In the closing hours members of the Commons were in merry mood. There was a long wait while conferences between managers of the two Houses were under way. All party differences went to the winds; members sang all the old songs and waged a battle royal with order papers and blue books.

The deputy speaker, bombarded by a host of questions, beat a hasty retreat. Miss Agnes MacPhail was deluged under confetti of torn bills, but came out of the ordeal laughing and retaliating in kind. The fun waxed furious. One of the Quebec members seized the sword of the sergeant-at-arms and used it gaily as a baton to beat time to the songs.

The end of the session came nearly four hours after the scheduled time. Differences between the Commons and Senate arose over a couple of bills—one amending the Canada Temperance Act in regard to the right of private individuals in British Columbia to import liquor, and the other touching the cancellation of leases of Dominion lands. The Senate amended the bills, and the Commons declined to accept the Senate amendments. Managers were appointed by each House, and there were protracted conferences.

In the end the House accepted the Senate amendments of both bills. The Commons managers proposed to make the exercise of the control of the import by British Columbia subject to approval by the Legislature, but this was rejected by the Senate, and the bill was accepted without the section giving the province control of imports. The section setting aside a reserve in the Smoky River region of Alberta was rejected previously by the Commons, and in this the Senate concurred.

During debate on this bill a protest against the assertion of the right of amendment of Commons bills was entered by Lucien Cannon, who declared, amid Liberal and Progressive cheers that the sooner there was Senate reform the better.

As the delay became more prolonged the sitting of the house was suspended. Members left the chamber to sing together in the lobbies, where the day before two of their colleagues had almost come to blows.

Arm in arm, two by two, they then re-entered the chamber, Hance Logan leading, singing "We Won't Go Home Till Morning."

Church Takes Chair.

With mock solemnity Hon. G. P. Graham and Hon. Dr. Beland gravely conducted T. L. Church to the Speaker's chair, and Mr. Church sat on the throne, three-cornered hat in hand. Members roared when he immediately called for a song as the order of the day.

Songs gave way to more battles with bills, one daring Conservative invading the Progressive stronghold, only to be snowed out with papers. Then came a stand-up battle on the floor, Liberals on one side, Progressives and Conservatives on the other.

A contingent of members of all parties stormed the press gallery and a lively battle between parliament-

Vows Dominion Must Advertise Products To Win World Trade

TORONTO, June 27.—That Canada needs world-wide publicity was the message to the Dominion of Sir Charles F. Higham, M.P., for South Islington, in an interview today.

As an Englishman who is supposed to know what is going on in the world, Sir Charles declared that he didn't know very much about Canada because we didn't advertise very much.

"I don't know what type of manufactures Canada can produce best," he said. "What Canada is famous for is her fine foodstuffs, admitted as such by everybody who came into contact with them during the war, and the envy of all nations. They gave the world a great advertisement of Canadian manhood; now in peace times the same must be done for Canadian products in the world's markets."

"It is the duty of the Englishman to come here and find out what you want and then help you get it. I do not say this with the slightest intention to criticize. What does Canada want collectively? Is it money, manufactures, development, or more immigrants? Decide what you want as a nation and then get it. What one wants badly enough, one usually gets," he concluded.

The speech follows: Honorable Members of the Senate: Members of the House of Commons: In relieving you of the duty of further attendance in Parliament, I desire to express my pleasure and satisfaction at the extent to which in addition to other matters of public interest, you have found it possible to deal with the many important subjects which your consideration was invited at the opening of the session.

The readjustment of the customs tariff, to the consideration of which much time has been given, will, it is hoped, meet in a considerable degree the desire for tariff revision, while not creating any serious disturbance in industrial conditions.

THE attention of the government to the question of transportation covers the recommendation of the special committee of the House of Commons, which has so fully investigated the whole problem, and the resultant legislation will effect immediate substantial reductions in freight rates in a manner which cannot fail to be of far-reaching benefit to all parts of the Dominion.

The measures passed to aid or control the marketing of certain farm products, and the manufacture, marketing and sale of fertilizers, for the extension of cold storage facilities, and for further experimental and research work in the control of fruit diseases, and the eradication of bovine tuberculosis, should prove of substantial service in the development of the grain, livestock, dairying and fruit production industries of the country, and in further protection against their natural foes.

Pursuant to representations made on behalf of the Prairie Provinces legislation has been adopted for the re-establishment of a wheat board, which it is hoped will meet the desire for a more equitable method of marketing Canadian wheat.

THE special committee of the House of Commons appointed to examine into the questions and problems related to the welfare of soldiers and their dependents has submitted many useful and important recommendations on pensions, insurance, land settlement, sheltered employment and other aspects of re-establishment which, together with the legislation based thereon should do much to insure fulfillment of the just and patriotic purposes these measures are intended to serve.

The co-ordination, under one ministerial head, of the defense forces of Canada in a single department of national defense, is certain to increase efficiency, and at the same time effect a much-needed economy in these branches of the national service.

By amendment to the election laws, full freedom of the franchise has been secured for additional thousands of Canadian women.

Substantial progress has been made in the negotiations which have taken place with respect to granting the control of the natural resources of the three western provinces to their respective provincial governments.

IT IS gratifying to observe that the depression of business is gradually becoming relieved, and that unemployment throughout the Dominion has correspondingly decreased. The conference being arranged between the federal and provincial authorities will, it is hoped, disclose means of more effectively dealing with problems incidental to unemployment, whenever, and wherever they may arise.

The success of the recent loan operations of the Dominion is gratifying to all. The measures adopted to provide needed additional revenue give assurance of a determination to make reasonable provision for public service and to maintain the high credit of Canada in the money market of the world.

Members of the House of Commons: I thank you for the supplies granted for the carrying on of the public services of the Dominion. The sums appropriated will be expended with due regard to economy and efficiency.

Honorable Members of the Senate: Members of the House of Commons: In view of the approval you have given to the treaties concluded at the Washington conference on the limitation of armaments, the government will be in a position immediately to sanction on behalf of Canada, the ratification of these agreements,

SENATE INSISTS ON B. C. AMENDMENT

EXPLAIN BAN ON LADY RHONDDA

British Lords Set Forth Reasons For Excluding Coal King's Daughter.

Declare Terms of Patent To Father Denies Her Seat in House.

LONDON, Eng., June 27.—Aside from common law provisions the specific character of Lady Rhondda's title precluded her from occupying a seat in the House of Lords, it is set forth in the written reasons for her exclusion from the upper chamber of parliament, given out by the committee on privileges today.

Lady Rhondda, heir of the late coal king and Great Britain's premier woman of business, recently had her claim to a seat in the Lords denied by a vote of 26 to 24 in this committee.

Lord Birkenhead, the lord chancellor, in delivering the leading opinion of the majority said that Lady Rhondda, apart from such disqualifications as were imposed by common law, was incapable of receiving a writ of nobility under which she inherited.

The patent conferred a peerage on Viscount Rhondda, and after his death Lady Rhondda, with remainder, and after her death to her male heirs, but when it came to define the incidence of the dignity conferred on her

Rhondda and those males who might hereafter hold the dignity, on the one hand, and Viscountess Rhondda, on the other, giving to the former and by silence denying to the latter a right to a seat, a place and a voice in the Lords.

The case was not one of a suspension of a right or an abeyance of an activity. The holder of a peerage dignity who was a minor was not entitled to receive a writ, but might grow up and would then become so entitled.

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BANDITS WILL ATTACK CANTON

LONDON, June 27.—A dispatch to the Central News from Hong Kong says Dr. Sun Yat Sen, head of the southern government, has enlisted 3,000 bandits, and is preparing to attack Canton. Warships are co-operating in the movement.

The dispatch adds that Dr. Sun demands \$2,000,000, upon the payment of which he will desist from the operation and quit Canton.

HAIL COMPLETELY DESTROYS CROPS

CALGARY, Alb., June 27.—Sweeping down a path three miles wide and forty miles long, hail completely destroyed the crops between Blind Creek and Milo in Central Alberta on Monday evening.

In no part of the area affected did the hail pass outside its three-mile boundary, and it stopped at Milo as suddenly as it had begun.

The storm was over in less than an hour.

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Pay Tribute To Premier King's Able Leadership of Liberalism in House

OTTAWA, June 27.—Liberal members of the House of Commons tonight had a pleasant surprise for Premier King. Gathering shortly before the house opened for its final sitting of the session they presented the prime minister with a clock and roses, in recognition of Mr. King's

The vase is inscribed: "To Our Chief—From Liberal Members of the House of Commons—June 27, 1922."

Hon. W. S. Fielding made the presentation in the name of his fellow Liberals. It was, Mr. Fielding observed, a great thing to be able to lead a party with a strong majority. But it was a much more difficult thing to do, as Mr. King had done,

lead a party successfully which did not have an actual majority in the house.

The prime minister, evidently much surprised at the presentation, warmly thanked his followers for their kindness and appreciation.

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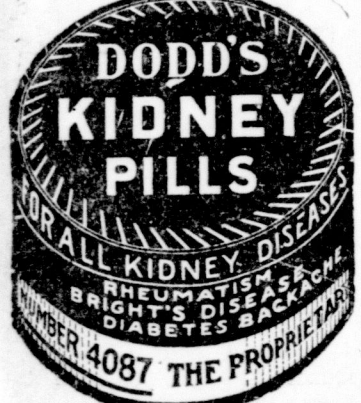
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
