STATES EMPIRE SHALL ALWAYS STAND UNITED

Mr. Neville Chamberlain Guest of Honor At Luncheon in Toronto.

LAUDS IMPERIALISM

Declares Britain Not Supporting Greeks in Near East Dispute.

TORONTO, Oct. 12.—Mr. Neville Chamberlain, M. P., was guest of honor at the Empire Club luncheon today. His speech was largely an exposition of imperialism—past and present. He showed that the present variety is much better than the past, and that perhaps it was better than any other policy even in the present. "Imperialism," said Mr. Chamberlain, "is not jingoism. We regard our position as a great trust, and in that spirit have we accepted fresh burdens in the mandates under the League of Nations. It is not every nation which is willing to accept mandates or responsibility."

Speaking of the Near East situation, Mr. Chamberlain said: "The purpose of the conditions imposed on Turkey after the war and the incorporation of the treaty of Sevres was not to punish the Turks—though God knows we had reason enough to—but to prevent Europe being the victim of such massacres as had taken place in Asia Minor. We were not supporting the Greeks—we have no cause to love them either—but merely acting as we have so often acted before—as the policeman of Europe."

Mr. Chamberlain then proceeded to trace the history of British colonial development. "It has been remarked," he said, "that the greater opportunity there has been for separation of colonies, the less has been the desire for separation."

"In a speech which my father made in Canada in 1883," (applause) "he referred to Canada as a colony, and it excited no comment. In 1905 he again was speaking to Canadians and he said, 'The British colonies are no longer colonies, but sister states, among whom the mother country by virtue of her age and her past achievements may claim to be first, but first only among equals.'"

"In 1918, Sir Robert Borden in London said, 'We come here to deal with these matters on a basis of perfect equality with the British prime minister.' Gentlemen, that is the position today, and the British constitution, which is an unwritten one, and founded upon mutual understanding, sympathy and tolerance, may be depended upon to ensure harmony in our future relations."

"In the future Canada may exceed the motherland as much in material resources and population as she does today in area, but I am confident that whatever happens, you will remain a great and united people."

FAMOUS TENOR RETURNS TO U. S. FOR CONCERT TOUR

NEW YORK, Oct. 12.—John McCormack, tenor, returned yesterday on the Olympic with his sister, returned abroad after a serious illness last spring. He said he had reduced his weight from 246 to 217 pounds, and never felt better in his life. The singer plans to give about eighteen concerts before Christmas, then return with Mrs. McCormack to spend the holidays with their children, who are at school in England.

Turnkey Everson of Guelph Jail Must Give Up Post After 35 Years' Service

GUELPH, Oct. 12.—An important matter that will have to be dealt with at the October sessions of the Wellington County Council, which opened here today, is the new provincial ruling governing the age of officials holding positions in the county jails.

A copy of the new regulations has

been forwarded to County Clerk Beattie, the contents of which were made known to the county councillors today in session. The new order means that George Everson, who has occupied the position of turnkey here for the last 35 years, and who is 71 years of age, will be superannuated, as he has passed the 70-year age limit. Accompanying the regulations is a letter from Inspector of Prisons Dunlop, who states that Mr. Everson will be relieved of his duties on October 31. Another change received in the new regulations authorizes the sheriff of the county to fix the salaries of all jail officials, and not the county council, as formerly.

Turnkey Everson was with the late jailer, John McNab, when that official was assaulted by prisoners who escaped from the local jail last Thanksgiving Day, and was himself severely injured at the time.

SUICIDE VERDICT IN FATAL SHOOTING

Galt Jury Find John Martz Guilty of Taking Own Life.

GALT, Oct. 12.—That the late John Martz came to his death as the result of a bullet fired from a revolver in his own hand while he was mentally deranged was the verdict of Coroner J. H. Radford's jury investigating the double shooting at 21 Queen street east, on Sept. 20, when Martz shot his son-in-law, E. Lamare, and then turned the gun on himself. The evidence went to show that deceased had been ailing for nearly a year, while the medical testimony was that he suffered from Bright's disease and the doctors gave

the opinion that it might cause a brain storm.
