Declares No Secret Agreement Made With Backus

GRIMSBY, Sept. 7 .- Characterizing the charge as utterly without foundation, Premier Drury today dealt with Hon. G. Howard Ferguson's statement in a recent speech that the English River timber limit had been disposed of by secret agreement between the Ontario government and E. W. Backus. Speaking at the Lincoln County U. F. O. picnic at Grimsby Beach this afternoon, the premier challenged Mr. Ferguson to prove the truth of his charges before an investigating body, and offered to stake his position in public life against that of the Conservative leader on the outcome of that investigation.

Dealing with the Ferguson charges the premier said: "There is scarcely a word of that true. In fact, I think I can say out
