## TRAVELLERS HELP TO TIGHTEN BONDS

W. D. Murphy, Supreme Secretary of United Body, Lauds Relationship.

**BANQUET AT PORT**

It required five special coaches of the L. and P. S. Railway to transport the members of the United Commercial Travellers of America, their wives and their sweethearts to the lakeside last night for the banquet arranged in connection with the first annual session of the Grand Council of Eastern Canada. St. Thomas added their quota, while the number who motored to the port for the affair considerably augmented the crowd. There was just the proper air of geniality to rob the occasion of stuff formality.

In the cosy cafeteria, which was in charge of General Manager Richards, the guests sat at long tables under the flags of Canada and the United States, and for two hours proved the comradeship which exists among all travelling men.

In view of the fact that there was to be dancing afterwards, all speeches and addresses were of the dwarf variety, not in merit but in length. The King, the Order and the Ladies. A couple of fine baritone solos by Otto Tiedt and a few songs by the many Orchestras added to the enjoyment of the evening.

**Relates History.**

E. R. Dromgole, chairman, proposed the toast of the grand council, adding to it the name of Fred St. Lawrence, grand councillor who, in reply, told the story of the foundation of the Canadian branch of the order, outlining its inception in 1919 and explaining that it was started with the idea of cementing closer bonds of friendship between the travelling men on both sides of the line at a time when there was a certain amount of constraint north and south in the criticism of one another.

"The success of the association," he said, "proves the sureness of the foundation we laid, the loyalty of the travelling men and their appreciation of the ideals for which their association stands."

W. D. Murphy of Columbus, Ohio, secretary, whose name was coupled with the toast of the order, in a brief address stressed the rapid growth the organization had made since the first council was formed in Columbus, Ohio, in 1918, when the membership of eight members and \$50.

"At the present time," he stated, "there are over 650 councils in North America, with a membership of more than 112,000."

"Brotherhood of man was the idea in the minds of those great-souled men who founded this order, and on this basis have we built well and thrived. Last week I was present at the annual grand council at Columbus, Ohio, and now I am present at the first annual gathering of the baby council of the order. I can assure you that in spite of the greater numbers who attended the Ohio council there is just as great enthusiasm and loyalty apparent here tonight as in the meeting of the parent council."

**Lauds Canada.**

"You Canadians up here have a country destined to take its place as one of the richest and most wonderful dominions in the world, and as you believe in the order, give of your best to it. It is your duty to will your council grow and increase in numbers and in the good that it can carry out in your country. ## Fathers Refuse the Use of Their Millions To Save Lives of Young Slayers



Chicago Millionaires Issue Joint Statement On Attitude Toward Sons.

**RETURN TRUE BILLS**

State Decides Trial Will Be Set For July the 15th.

Chicago, June 6.—Their millions will not be used to save Nathan Leopold, Jun., and Richard Loeb, confessed slayers of Robert Frank, from the gallows, a joint statement issued tonight by the fathers of the accused youths, both Chicago millionaires, said.

"Only such defence as that to which every human being is entitled will be provided for their sons," the statement said. "Assuming that the facts in this case are substantially as published, then the only proceeding that favors a few boys' lives investigation under the law, touching the mental responsibility of their accused sons."

"The fathers have no legal counsel outside the attorneys now representing the accused, with one possible exception, the statement said, and no large sums will be spent for either legal or medical talent, and, 'in no event, will the families of the accused boys use money in any attempt to defeat justice.'"

The statement, signed by Nathan F. Leopold, Sen., wealthy box manufacturer, and Albert H. Loeb, vice-president of Sears, Roebuck & Company, was issued a few hours after their youthful sons' brilliant university students, had been indicted for murder and kidnapping for ransom, each crime punishable by death, in connection with the slaying of 13-year-old Robert Frank, son of another Chicago millionaire. The statement said that the lawyers representing the accused boys have agreed that the amount of their fees shall be determined by a committee composed of the officers of the Chicago Bar Association.

True bills were returned this morning in the form of two indictments, one accusing the youths jointly of murder, and the other making the joint charge of kidnapping for ransom.

The youths will be arraigned next Wednesday, and the state will ask that the trial be set for July 15.

**BORDER SMUGGLING TO BE SUPPRESSED**

U. S. and Canadian Governments Sign Convention To Battle Illegal Trade.

Ottawa, June 6.—Shortly before adjournment of the House of Commons tonight, Premier Mackenzie King made a statement in which he summarized the terms of the new treaty between the government of the United States for the suppression of illegal smuggling across the international boundary. The statement follows:

"At noon today the secretary of state for the government of the United States and the Hon. Ernest Lapointe, K.C., minister of justice of the Dominion of Canada, for the Canadian government, signed a convention for the suppression of smuggling operations across the international boundary, the prosecution of persons violating the narcotic laws of either government and for kindred purposes."

"Each government is to furnish information on request to the appropriate officials of the other concerning clearances of vessels or the transportation of cargoes, shipments or loads of articles across the international boundary, and the transportation of the articles transported by land is subject to the payment of duty, also information respecting clearances of goods to any port where there is ground to suspect the owners or persons in possession of the cargo intend to smuggle it into American or Canadian territory."

**DECISION IS REVERSED ON EXCHEQUER COURT**

Supreme Court Gives Ruling Over Use of "Aspirin" Trademark.

Ottawa, June 6.—With Justices Ildington and Malouin dissenting, the supreme court of Canada today reversed the decision of the exchequer court, in the long drawn out battle over the right to the use of the term "Aspirin."

This trade-mark was first registered in Canada by a German company which assigned to a New York company. On the ground that "aspirin" is a drug, well known to chemists, which cannot be made a special trade article by the use of a trade mark, a firm manufacturing in Canada, applied to the exchequer court for an order to expunge the trade mark from the registry.
