What About the O. T. A.?

Possibly the question which will be most generally speculated upon today is the effect which Mr. Ferguson's victory will have upon the Ontario Temperance Act. Some of the men elected to support him were cutspoken in their condemnation of the present measure, few actively supported it, and many, including the leader himself, adopted an attitude which leaves them free to do as they wish now that they are in power. As whole, the party did not come out wholeheartedly in favor of a rigid enforcement of that measure, and those who exercised the hope that a Conservative victory might mean modification are today smiling
