Mount Vernon, Ill., Sept. 22.—A complete confession that he poisoned his wife and William Sweetin "because they were suffering and he wanted to put them out of their misery" was made today by Rev. Lawrence M. Hight, Ina Methodist pastor, after a night of grilling at the hands of State's Attorney Frank Thompson.

The minister broke under the strain of the fire of questions shortly before dawn after he had been confronted with the testimony of a coroner's chemist that arsenic also had been found in the vital organs of Sweetin.

For the confessed murders there will be no demand for the death penalty, Thompson said.

"I will not ask the death penalty," he said, "I will ask that the man be put in the penitentiary for life on both charges. That should suffice."

TILLSONBURG ALARMED OVER PETTY THEIVING

Board of Trade Calls Special Meeting To Cope With Situation.

Chief Carter obtained some excellent fingerprints at the White Star grocery, where N. McCrackin, Mrs. C. C. and every effort is being made to detect the guilty parties.
