

# FRENCH CRISIS SERIOUS

**Danger More Threatening Than at  
Any Time Since the Second  
Empire.**

### Opinions of French, English and German Press—Who Will Be

PARIS, Jan. 16.—President Perier in his message to the senate and chamber of deputies announcing his resignation, complains that during the past six months a campaign of defamation and insult against state institutions has been conducted. He says that respect and ambition for the country will not permit him to allow certain men every

land. During the reading of the communication the Socialists at certain passages almost created pandemonium, and at the conclusion of the reading only a few "vive la Republique" were heard.

The ministry met at 10 o'clock this morning to discuss the situation created by the resignation of President Casimir-Perier. The Socialist deputies met this afternoon to decide what action to take in the election of the President tomorrow.

The president's successor. The newspapers strongly condemn the resignation of the president. After reading the message of the President the chamber adjourned. As the members dispersed the Socialists raised an uproar, shouting "Vive Revolution Sociale," whereupon the other parties retorted, each with his own war cry.

Great excitement prevails throughout the city on account of the political crisis. All the groups of the chamber of deputies have denounced the situation to-day, but no definite action has been taken.

The national convention for the election of a president has been convoked for Thursday next. The convention comprises the members of the senate and chamber of deputies. It will meet in the palace of Versailles. The members of the cabinet had a conference with M. Perier to-day, at

The chief candidate for the Presidency will be Henry Brisson. The National Assembly may desire to re-elect M. Casimir-Perier, but he will probably refuse to come forward. M. Waldeck Rousseau is also mentioned, but he was an important member of the Cabinet of 1883. M. Dupuy wished M. Challemeil-Lacour to stand, but

The socialist deputies in a manifesto say: "Clemenceau-Perles goes never to return. He is vanquished by socialism. He departs in order to avoid a battle with the reactionists. His weakness of character has overthrown him. He was killed by the corruption of the regime of which he was the head and defeated by the intrigues of the president of the republic."
