(Continued From Page Seven.) Mr. McBride was speaking at 12:30, when attention was called to the fact that there was no quorum, and Mr. McPhillips moved the adjournment of the House under the provisional rules.

Mr. Speaker held that a quorum was present, and therefore Mr. McPhillips' motion was out of order. Mr. McBride resumed his remarks at 12:40, and continued, with occasional interruptions, until 1:15, when he was again called to order.

Mr. McBride continued to speak till 2:45, when Mr. Houston moved the adjournment of the debate. Before adjournment, Hon. Mr. Dunsinuir said he desired to express his regret for the language he had used towards Mr. Taitow, but he could not retract what he had said, and he was unjustly considering the provocation.

The House adjourned at 2:45 a.m. Mr. Speaker took the chair at 2:40 p.m. Mr. McBride rose to a question of privilege. He presented certain passages in a Colonialist editorial, from which he was proceeding to read when called to order by Mr. Speaker.

Mr. McBride appealed from the ruling of the chair, and was proceeding to argue in support of his motion when he was again ruled out of order.

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his place of employment, against any person, society, association, organization, directly or indirectly causing such damage, or who might be so caused.

He held that it would be very unfair to pass a drastic law affecting employers while workmen might commit the very offenses complained of with perfect impunity. He believed in equal fair play to all, and he hoped the honorable member of the bill and the House generally would accept his very necessary amendment.

Mr. Curtis suggested that Mr. Hunter should bring in his amendments to the form of a separate bill. Mr. Hunter asked if Mr. Curtis would promise to support such a bill if he brought it down?

Mr. Curtis said he would support such a bill if it was proved to him that employers were subject to the same grievances as the workmen. Mr. Hunter's amendment said it was a poor rule which did not work both ways. He would suggest that the matter be laid over until members should have an opportunity to fully consider the effect of the proposed amendments.

Mr. Curtis insisted that the amendments should be brought in as a separate bill. He moved the adjournment of the debate until 11:15 p.m. until 2 o'clock this afternoon.

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weather and a steady rise in the temperature. By Sunday, the 26th, this extensive area was centered over the Territories, while over California the barometer was very low, and the weather was very stormy, and a tendency for dry northerly winds throughout the North Pacific coast, and consequently a warm wave set in which reached its maximum upon Monday, the 26th, when the temperature rose to 50 in the interior of this portion of Vancouver Island, and over the Lower Mainland, and 84 degrees was recorded at Kamloops. The barometer then fell along the coast in advance of a low pressure area from the Pacific, which spread over Vancouver Island to the Mainland during Monday night. This movement caused a decided fall in temperature recorded on the Lower Mainland by local thunderstorms, and over the north of Victoria lightning was seen. By Tuesday night the temperature had fallen to 40 in the interior of the coast, and 28.00 inches over the Rockies caused a strong westerly wind upon the Strait of Juan de Fuca. In the Cariboo district rain fell upon six days of the month, amounting to over one inch.

Considerable rain in the form of showers and thunderstorms has also occurred in many portions of the Territories, particularly in Alberta, where the rivers became dangerously high. Upon Saturday, the 25th, a heavy rain fell over the entire Alberta towards Manitoba, the wind at Kamloops, B.C., was from the west at an hour, and was followed by a sudden drop in temperature from 52 degrees at 5 p.m. to 34 at 8 p.m. Saturday. The warmest days in the Territories and Alberta, during the month of May, were the 25th and 26th, when the highest daily temperatures reached 50. Victoria, amount of heavy rain, 4.5 inches; rain, only a trace; highest temperature, 71, on the 26th, and lowest, 45.5 on the 25th.
