The bill also provides that the House of Commons shall have it in its power to finally decree-whether amendments made to bills by the House of Lords shall be accepted.

to Hold Aloof From the Party. London Aloof From the Party. London, April 24.—Prime Minister Roses-bery this evening presided at a meeting of the City Liberal Club. He made an address in which he said that the Government felt stronger and better equipped to meet the wars of Parliament than when it started under the overwhelming cellpse caused by the retirement of Premier Gladstone. The Government found itself separated from many Liberals with whom it had co-operated in the part, but he believed that the defection from the party was not due to the lish ques-tion. In his opinion it was due to the Franchise bill of 1884. Many Liberals had since held aloof from the party, was null.
