—The *Bangor Democrat*, in publishing the cause of a detachment of the 54th Regiment having been stationed at Malabar, namely, unjustifiable proceedings and coarse threats on the part of the individual in charge of the American armed posse at Pish River, issues an edit, which could only be equalled by the Emperor of the Celestial Empire. We beg of our old men and women to keep cool, and not to think of taking up their crutches yet awhile. Hear the gallant Major of the *Democrat*—

"This excuse for extending the invasion of Maine 30 miles to the confluence of the Madawaska with the St. John, was trumped up for the occasion, and is too naked and flimsy to answer any purpose except to excite our disgust at its shallowness. It makes no difference, whether it is British regulars or a British armed posse that desecrates our soil!—The hostile force must be withdrawn, peacefully, or driven beyond our borders, forcibly. We go for an immediate issue, and so do the people in this region. British troops cannot be quartered within the borders of Maine; if permitted, it will cast a stain upon our honor blacker than the shades of Erebus. Let those troops be withdrawn, or let the physical force of Maine be called into exercise. Whatever others may think, we believe the spirit of 1776 and 1812 is not yet extinct, and if there is another manifestation of it, it will be to some purpose.—*Furberance has ceased to be a virtue.*"

LATER FROM EUROPE.
—*BRITAIN—EGYPT—INDIA—CHINA.*
By the arrival of the packet ship *England* at New York, we have London dates to the 5th December. The steamer *Oriental* had arrived from Alexandria bringing news to Nov. 23, and also the overland mail, with letters from India, and intelligence from China to Aug. 4.

The intelligence from China embraces an official account of the capture by the British expedition, under the command of Brig. Gen. Buzell, of the town of Tchu-sun, in the island of Tchu-sun, on the 5th of July.

On the 3d of August a number of ships of war proceeded up the Bay of Canton, for the purpose of attacking the forts at the Bogue, which it was anticipated they would take immediate possession of.

In Afghanistan Dost Mahomed had been defeated by the British troops.

According to the news from Alexandria, it appears that the war with the Pacha of Egypt has at an end. Com. Napier had appeared at Alexandria, and opened a negotiation with Achmet Ali, first for an exchange of prisoners, and subsequently for a termination of the war. Com. Napier had been authorized to communicate to the Pacha the revocation of the act of the Sultan deposing him from the Pacha of Egypt, and the Pacha had agreed to give up the Turkish fleet, and also that the Egyptian troops should evacuate Syria by sea. With these concessions on the part of the Pacha the war appeared to be at an end, and all other arrangements would follow as a matter of course. There had been another tremendous explosion at Acre, by which 280 lives were lost, including a number of British seamen and soldiers.

In the French Chamber of Deputies, the debate on the Address in answer to the King's speech, was not an end.

It was said that the French and English Cabinets were on better terms, and that the tone of the last despatches of the latter was more satisfactory.

The Date from China is of Aug. 4th.—On the 5th of the preceding month the city and island of Chusan were captured by Brig. Gen. Burrell, after a brief and not very serious resistance. The Chinese Governor was killed. The inhabitants had left the town, but were returning. We regret to perceive that our troops had committed such excesses as to necessitate punishment. The soldiers had been excited by unlimited indulgence in a spirit called "samsu," distilled from rice. The Chinese appear to be as intractable as ever. At Amoy, the Blonde's boat with a flag of truce, had been fired upon, and the Blonde in return battered down the forts, and destroyed the junk there. At Ningpo, the letter to the Emperor was returned open to Captain Elliot, who declared Ningpo and Shanghai, and all the intermediate ports to Nanking, in a state of blockade. It was reported that Admiral Elliot, who intended to proceed to Pecheliee, in the neighborhood of Peking, with a part of his force. It appears by the accounts from Macao that the blockade of Canton had been very rigidly enforced. In the meantime, Gov. Lin, was making very active demonstrations of hostility.—*London Courier.*

The official despatch describing the capture of Chusan states that the loss of the Chinese is estimated at about 25 killed; number of wounded not known.

The ordnance captured at Chusan, (on shore) was 30 iron two to three pounders, 40 iron four to six pounders and 15 iron six to eight pounders; 5 iron nine pounders, and one brass 61 pounder; total 91. The guns except the brass one were Chinese make. The brass one has the date of 1801, made by Richard Phillips.
