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Report of the Adjoined Meeting of the Rate Payers Bridgeport Water District.

The adjourned meeting of the rate-payers, under the Water Supply Act, for Bridgeport, took place at Denison's Hall, on Wednesday evening, the 19th inst., R. B. Flanagan, Esq., in the chair.

The report of the committee appointed to audit the accounts of the Commissioners, and the books of the Secretary and Treasurer being called for, W. M. Forsyth, Esq., read a report as follows:—

"We, the committee appointed to audit the books of the Commissioners and the Water Supply for the town of Bridgeport, beg leave to report that we have examined the books kept by John C. Cox, Esq., Secretary and Treasurer of said Commissioners, for the year ending November 1st, 1889, and find them substantially correct.

"The report having been laid upon the table, it was then moved by Mr. E. Higgins and seconded by Mr. O. T. Daniels, that said report be received and adopted in place of their own choice.

"It was then moved by W. A. Craig and seconded by Geo. Murdoch, that the accounts of the Commissioners be audited and reported on at the next annual meeting, an amendment to which was moved by C. J. Willis and seconded by A. J. Drysdale.

"The Fishery Inspector for this county, accompanied by Mr. W. M. Bailey of Round Hill, has lately visited the 'Lake' and Henry Thomas, dam on the Bear River waters, with a view to putting in fishways. Applications have been made to the Dominion Government for stocking the east and west branches of the river with ten thousand salmon and salmon trout.

"On Thursday last a collision occurred between the S. S. Evangeline and the Montreal. It was reported that the Evangeline, with Capt. Corbett at the wheel, was leaving Digby pier, the Montreal, which had been cruising about in the harbor trying to get into the pier, was noticed by Capt. Corbett, who gave the signal to stop.
