TREASURER'S REPORT

To the Warden and Councillors for the Municipality of Antapolls Co., Gentlemen:—I beg leave to submit the following Financial Statement for the Municipality, as found on Dec. 31st, 1922:—

The amount due from Collectors is larger than usual and can be accounted for partially, at least, by very stormy weather the last week of the old year which made it impossible for the Collectors from outlying Wards to get to the Banks to make deposits, this is proven by the fact more than one half of the amount outstanding has been deposited by the Collectors since the books were closed.

We have had no claims for sheep killed by dogs during the year. The only item outstanding on current account is \$10 for one coupon not presented, and on Road Fund there is about \$2,400 uncollected.

Statements of General Account, Contingent Account, Forest Protection, Sinking Fund, Court House Account, are appended.

A few belated items of Ferry Service appear in this year's Contingent Account.

EVANGELISTIC MISSION AT LAWRENCETOWN

The opening services of the Lawrencetown Evangelistic campaign were held on Sunday, Jany. 28th, and were conducted by Rev. Gipsy John Hawkins, assisted by Mrs. Hawkins and Miss Winifred Gould, Gospel soloist.

The subject on Sunday morning was "Service in God's Vineyard", the Evangelist emphasizing that God's Vineyard to us was the Home, the Church, the community and the world itself.
