DOMINION OF CANADA.

ORDER IN COUNCIL.

GOVERNMENT HOUSE, OTTAWA,
Monday, the 8th Day of
September, 1884.

PRESENT:

HIS EXCELLENCY THE GOVERNOR-GENERAL IN
COUNCIL.

WHEREAS, the disease of pleuro-pneumonia
prevails among neat cattle in the
Western State of Illinois as well as in
other more Eastern of the United States, and
there is reason to believe that neat cattle for
breeding purposes have been sent from the
State of Illinois to more Western States and
Territories;

On the recommendation of the Minister of
Agriculture, and under the provisions of the
Act of the Parliament of Canada, 42 Victoria,
chapter 23, entitled "An Act to provide
for the prevention of contagious diseases affect-
ing animals" made applicable to the North-
West Territories by Proclamation in 1883;

His Excellency by and with the advice of
the Queen's Privy Council for Canada, has
been pleased to order and it is hereby ordered,
that the importation of neat cattle now per-
mitted from the United States and Territories
into the Province of Manitoba and the North-
West Territory of Canada be and the same is
hereby prohibited except on the following
conditions, namely:

1. At Emerson, in Manitoba, or the points
of Fort Walsh and Fort McLeod in the Pro-
visional Districts of Alberta and Assiniboia, or
such other point or points as may hereafter
be indicated by the Minister of Agriculture.

2. For stock or breeding purposes neat cattle
which have been brought to the Canadian
frontier for importation may be allowed to
cross, subject to the regulations hereinafter
recited.

3. For transit, from West to East, through
the Provisional Districts of Alberta and Assiniboia,
and the Province of Manitoba, via
Emerson or Gretna, to the State of Minnesota,
neat cattle may be allowed to cross the Cana-
dian frontier at the points of Fort Walsh and
Fort McLeod aforesaid, subject to the regula-
tions hereinafter recited.

4. At Emerson, such cattle coming from the
East shall not be allowed to cross the Canadian
frontier unless after inspection by a duly
authorized veterinary surgeon appointed by
the Minister of Agriculture they shall be
declared free from contagious disease, and
also from well-founded suspicion thereof; and
further, such cattle shall be subject to a
Quarantine of sixty days, or such other period
as may appear to the Minister of Agriculture
advisable.

5. Any cattle desired to be entered at the
points of Fort Walsh and Fort McLeod aforesaid,
whether for stock or breeding purposes
or for transit, shall be inspected by a duly
authorized veterinary surgeon appointed by
the Minister of Agriculture, and shall not be
allowed to cross the Canadian frontier unless
they are declared by such surgeon to be free
from contagious disease, and also from well-
founded suspicion thereof.

6. The owner or owners of any such cattle
desired to be entered at any of the points
aforesaid, shall, on making application for
entry, produce a duly attested certificate,
indicating the State or Territory and particu-
lar locality from which they may have been
brought.

7. The importer of such cattle shall pay a
fee, graded on a scale hereto annexed, to the
Customs Officer or other person duly author-
ized to act as such, for defraying the expense
of such inspection, the cattle not being allow-
ed to cross the Canadian frontier until such
fee is paid, that is to say, for:

One animal 1 dollar,
5 animals and under 50 cents each;
but total fee for over 5 ani-
mals not less than \$2.50
10 animals and under 30 cents each;
but total fee for over 10 ani-
mals not less than \$3.00
20 animals and under 20 cents each;
but total fee for over 20 ani-
mals not less than \$4.00
50 animals and under 12 cents each;
but total fee for over 50 ani-
mals and not less than \$6.00
Over 50 animals 19 cents each.

8. No car which has been loaded with cattle
in the United States and crossing the Canadian
frontier shall be allowed afterwards to carry
Canadian cattle.

9. No car or train carrying such United States
cattle in transit from West to East
between the points above named, shall be
allowed to be or remain situated in close prox-
imity to any Canadian cattle.

10. Every car containing such United States
cattle in transit between the points above
mentioned shall be kept, as far as possible, apart from
cars or trains containing Canadian cattle or
Canadian goods.

11. No car containing such United States
cattle in transit between the points above
named, shall form any part of a train carrying
Canadian cattle.

12. Every car or train carrying cattle in
transit from West to East between the points
hereinbefore named, shall stop at such fixed
place or places as shall be named by the Min-
ister of Agriculture for the purpose of rest,
feeding and watering, and such place or places
shall be declared "infected" within the terms
of "The Animals Contagious Diseases Act,
1879," being strictly isolated and all commu-
nication with them prohibited, except by the
officers for men in charge of the trains or in
charge of such infected place or places.

13. Every car which has been used for
carrying animals from the United States or Ter-
ritories, in transit through the districts of
Alberta, Assiniboia, or the Province of Mani-
toba via Emerson or Gretna, shall be thor-
oughly disinfected and disinfected before re-
entering the Province of Manitoba, in such
manner as shall be ordered by the Minister of
Agriculture.

NOR-WESTERS.

Regina.

Leaders. Frigley and Johnson went out on
Sunday morning to see the fifth and stock
of the Sussex Land and Stock Company at
the Qu'Appelle Valley, of which Company
Mr. Frigley is a Director. They found the
417 head of cattle which arrived lately (and
an amount of which was given in last week's
Leader) had arrived and were in first rate
condition, with the exception of one which
had got through the ice the night before and
was drowned.

Mr. Joseph C. Irvine, Postmaster, Regina,
has received instructions from the Depart-
ment of Agriculture at Ottawa, to collect
the average yield of the various crops and
agricultural products, the number and
condition of live stock, and other mat-
ters affecting farmers interests. The infor-
mation desired has no reference to taxation,
but is wanted solely for the benefit of
farmers, and to assist and induce immigra-
tion.

Mr. Irvine has been supplied with Sched-
uled forms to fill up, which he will gladly
supply in application to such of our farmers
as desire to assist in obtaining the useful
information desired. The returns must be
in by 30th November current.

Public meetings are being organized and
will be held shortly at various places for the
discussion of matters pertaining to the ac-
tual interests in the Northwest Territories,
particularly the Hudson Bay Territory and
representation in the Dominion Parliament.

A meeting will be held at Wolsley to-
morrow (Friday) at 2 o'clock, and another at
Qu'Appelle station (Troy) in a few days.
Others will be held at Regina, Moose Jaw,
etc., the dates of which have not yet been
fixed.

THE DEAD EDITOR.

Interesting Information About W. F.
Storey, of the Chicago Times.

One of the strange ambitions of Mr.
Storey's declining years was to erect for him-
self a magnificent residence of proportions
and elegance so great as to entitle it to be
called a palace.

As is well known he entered upon this
undertaking some years ago, and the mam-
moth white marble edifice, still unfinished,
though having eaten up hundreds and
thousands of dollars in its construction, re-
mains down on Vincennes avenue to testify
of his strange desire.

In personal appearance Mr. Storey was
tall and always neatly dressed. His hair
was abundant and snowy white. His fore-
head was high and his hazel eyes clear and
bright. As a journalist Mr. Storey had a
clear, concise, and very forcible style. He
was more of a paragraphist than essayist.
In his editorials he often repeated the
prominent idea again and again, each time
with verbiage so forcible yet different that
the effect was like that of the repeated blows
of a battering ram, as many of them who
have felt the force of them can testify. Even
his enemies, and they were many, attest to
his remarkable ability as a journalist.

For many years he was an indefatigable
worker. He almost lived in his office. The
first man at work in the morning, he was
frequently the last man to leave at night.
He was a master of the business, and he
gave to every detail his personal attention.
He organized his staff for work and not for
ornament. He was the sole head. There
were chiefs of departments, but no one em-
ployed could lord it over another. Every-
one could appeal to the "old man," and a
boy was quite as apt to be listened to
patiently as an old member of the staff.
Considering his disposition Mr. Storey often
exhibited a singularly confiding nature. He
would believe implicitly whatever was told
him, and sometimes he was misled by dis-
solving men before taking decisive action.
He would not confer the title of managing
editor upon any employe until his own fail-
ing health made it absolutely necessary that
there should be an active and responsible
chief. When he started an evening paper
in 1876 he attempted to manage that also
as he had his morning paper, but finding the
task too onerous, he at length in brief notes,
introduced the various heads of departments
that he had appointed a manager for the
evening paper. He took good care, how-
ever, to explain that he was not the manager
of the morning paper.

So implacable were his hatreds that he
neither forgot nor forgave an injury.

The present search, the vigil long
Of him who treasured up a wrong,
found in him the fullest exemplification.

The general who suppressed his newspaper
for treasonable utterances during the war,
the burlesque actress who, assisted by some
some of her retainers, assaulted him on the
stage, the judge who committed him to
jail for contempt, the gambler with whom
he had a shooting affray on Randolph street,
the physician who attended his second wife
in her fatal illness, and a score of others, who
at one time and another crossed his path,
were never lost sight of. At first he
assailed them unmercifully, and at last,
having pursued them to his heart's content,
he gave orders that their names should
never again be mentioned in his paper, unless
they died or did something disreputable.
His few friendships were rare and lasting.
