Mr. Rudyard Kipling to address the Club, but without success. They endeavoured also to secure a number of other notable men, who, while obliged to decline the invitation, promised to meet the Club at some future time.

Various meetings of the Executive were held from time to time to make arrangements for the meetings above mentioned.

It will be noted that on several occasions, Dr. Fraser, the Superintendent of the School for the Blind, and the management of that School, kindly placed at the disposal of the Club, without any charge therefor, the Assembly Hall of that institution, and the Executive Committee recommend that some suitable acknowledgement should be made to them for their kindness in that regard.

The committee also recommend that in view of the fact that the Club has been only about eight months in existence, the next annual fee should not be collected until January 1st, 1908; that any members joining between the present date and the first of the year should have their subscription cover the balance of the present year as well as the year 1908, and that the by-laws be amended accordingly.
