CONNECTING LINKS.—After they had come down from the mountain Jesus and the twelve lingered yet a little time in the neighbourhood of Cesarea Philippi. The wonderful miracle that healed the lunatic boy once more astonished the assembled multitudes. Jesus still sought solitude. He resumed his journeyings, and remained in quiet in Galilee and Capernaum. He gave no public teaching, but still taught his disciples the great principles on which his kingdom was to be founded. Our lesson brings one of them prominently forward.
