CATTLE AND SINGER. The recoupts of Live stock have been limited, and prices in constock have been lausted, and prices in consequence are firm. Choice expert cattle are firm at about 6c, per lb. for spring delivery, but shipments at present are almost confined to American stock. Good butchers' cattle are worth 4½c, to 5c., but should the supply increase, the latter would probably not be paid. Ordinary cattle sell at 3½c, to 4c. The supply of sheep and lambs is restricted and prices firm at 5c, for the former, and 5½c, to 6c. for the latter. Calves are in light recoipt and firm at 9c, per lb. dressed weight.

FLOUR AND MEAL - The flour market is Floin AND MRIL. — The flour market is firm. Transactions have been few on account of the high prices asked, and offerings were limited as holders were unwilling to sell. Cadro Superior Extra sold two days ago at \$250 and \$4.75. Extra is nominal at \$4.50 to \$4.60. Eran is in better demand and to \$4.60. Bran is in better demand and higher, sales being reported at \$14. Oatweal is firm; offerings small, and demand fair, with sales of choice cars at equal to \$4.923 and \$4.95 and ordinary worth \$4.80. Grain.—Business fairly active and the general tone strong. Receipts of wheat are more liberal, the stock of barley shows a decrease. When has been in good demand. The unsettled feeling in Chicago for some time has induced buyers here to hold off. The transactions reported are few, but a good deal has been bought outside by our exporters. Recently car lots of No. 1 fall sold at \$1.07, No. 2 at \$1.05, No. 3 at \$1.03, and goose at 98c. On Monday No. 2 fall sold at \$1.07, No. 2 at \$1.05. 
