I cannot dismiss you without earnestly desiring you to promote, by precept and example, among your respective Counties the regular habits of piety and morality, the surest foundations of all private and public felicity, and at this juncture, I particularly recommend to you to explain that this Province is singularly blessed, not with a mutilated Constitution but with a Constitution which has stood the test of experience, and is the very image and transcript of that of Great-Britain, by which she has established and secured to her subjects as much freedom and happiness as is possible to be enjoyed under the subordination necessary to civilized society.
