

A NEW IRISH LEAGUE.

National Temperance Revival on Father Mathew's Anniversary—Glorious Crusade in Ireland.

(Liverpool Catholic Times March 28th) The new Irish temperance movement was launched on Passion Sunday. Not since Daniel O'Connell first raised the cry of emancipation has a movement been inaugurated which promises to effect a more glorious reform.

ONE MIGHTY CONFEDERACY. for the realization of their national aspirations, so they will now join for the purpose of bringing to a triumphant issue the cause in which the banner was lifted amidst the blessings of the Church last Sunday.

INDIVIDUAL ACTIVITY AND ZEAL. "Without your willing co-operation," remark the Leston prelates, "we cannot hope to see the work carried out, as we feel called upon to strive with all our strength to secure that it shall be, so as to bring within the range of its influence every one of those, without exception, for our care or neglect of whose souls we shall one day have to answer before the throne of God."

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CARTHUSIAN MONKS.

An Insight into Their Lives.

There has just entered the Grande Chartreuse a man very well known in Grenoble, M. Félix Faure, a former auditor at the Council d'Etat, author of a History of St. Louis, and of a work on the Assemblies of the States in Dauphiny during the year 1788, which made a considerable stir a couple of years ago.

The Order of St. Bruno is the only one whose General does not reside in Rome; he lives at the Grande Chartreuse. The present General is Dom Anselm Brignon, not yet 65 years old, but who has labored many years in the order, which he entered very young.

Among the other religions to be found at the Grande Chartreuse must be mentioned, in the first place, General Baron de Nicolai, whose brother is one of the luminaries of the Russian Senate. Baron de Nicolai is a Russian by birth, and has been in the Russian service.

I may also mention among the Fathers of the Grande Chartreuse the brother of the publishers Oudin of Paris and Poitiers, and M. Grand Perier of Grenoble, and the Cambrer family.

The Carthusians rise at five o'clock, summer and winter, and go to bed after the Ave Maria, at six p.m. in winter and at seven in summer, after having divided their day between meditation, prayer, manual labor, study and the public offices.

The Carthusians devote themselves to what studies they please, but they may not publish anything without the permission of their superiors. The library of the Grande Chartreuse comprises four or five apartments full of books. At the finest in the world, was transferred to Grenoble, and is now the

library of the capital of Dauphiny. They have not yet succeeded in completely replacing this old library, although their lingers, which they get made by the inhabitants of the country a few miles off the Chartreuse at the foot of the mountains on which it is situated, brings them in a great deal of money.

Although they are loved in the country, which is, however, the least "clerical" part of France—they were afraid, at the time of the decrees against religious orders, of being expelled. For this reason they sent to their monastery in England the MSS. and more valuable books of the order, made by himself, of L. Saen's paintings, a laboring life of St. Bruno, the originals of which are in the Louvre.

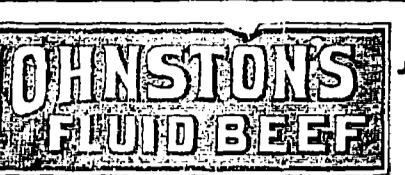
