COMMERCIAL.

FLOUR.—It now looks as if the market had touched bottom for the season, as a number of good demand prices have moved up 5c to 10c all round. The general run of prices is as follows:—Patent winter, \$5.05@5.30; patent spring, \$5.15@5.35; straight roller, \$4.70@4.80; extra, \$4.40@4.55; superfine, \$4.00@4.25; fine, \$3.50@3.75; city strong bakers, \$5.10@5.00; Manitoba bakers, \$4.60@5.00; Ontario bags—extra, \$2.10@2.20; superfine, \$2.00@2.10.

OATMEAL, &c.—The market continues firm with an upward tendency in prices, in sympathy with the advance in oats. We quote:—Granulated and rolled oats, \$4.30 to \$4.50 per bbl, and \$2.15 per bag; standard and fine oatmeal \$4.20 to \$4.25 per bbl, and bags \$2.05 to \$2.10. Pot barley \$4.15. Pearl barley No. 1, \$7.25 per bbl, \$3.75 per half bbl; No. 2, \$6.75 per bbl, \$3.50 per half bbl; \$2.80 per packet of 49 lbs; \$2 per packet of 45 lbs. Gold dust cornmeal \$4.25 per bbl; split peas \$3.25 per bbl.

WHEAT.—Quite a lot of Ontario wheat have been shipped to England on the basis of \$1.04 to \$1.05 here. No. 2 Manitoba hard wheat is quoted at \$1.06 to \$1.07, and No. 3 do at 97c to 98c. Prices, however, are more or less nominal.

FEED.—Prices remain about as last quoted, namely:—Ontario bran \$14 to \$16.50 as to quality and quantity; shorts \$16 to \$17, middlings \$19 to \$20, and molasses \$22 to \$25.

CORN.—No receipts, and car lots are quoted at 65c to 70c duty paid.

PEAS.—Since the last report there have been sales at 80c to 87c per 65 lbs, and we quote 80c to 81c.

OATS.—The market is firm, sales of car lots having been made at 30c to 37c per 31 lbs, some holders refusing to sell at the outside figure.

BARLEY.—The market is firm and lighter. No. 3 being quoted at 50c to 56c, and No. 3 extra at 57c to 58c, and No. 2 at 60c to 62c. Feed barley 48c to 52c.

BREWERY.—Remains firm at 56c to 59c per bush, and at these prices the market remains firm.

PROVISIONS.

PORK, LARD, &c.—We quote:—Canada short cut mess pork, per bbl, \$16.00 @ \$17.00; Canada short cut clear pork, per bbl, \$10.00 @ \$10.00; Chicago extra clear mess, per bbl, \$10.00 @ \$10.00; Mess pork, American, per bbl, \$14.50 @ \$15; India mess lard, per tierce, \$10.00 @ \$10.00; Extra mess lard, per bbl, \$14.50 @ \$15.00; Hams, city cured, per lb, 10c @ 11c; Lard, pure, in pails, per lb, 9c @ 10c; Lard, compound, in pails, per lb, 7c @ 7c; Bacon, per lb, 9c @ 10c; Short ribs, per lb, 8c @ 9c.

DRESSED HOGS.—The continued mild and open weather has prevented supplies from coming forward, but we hear the sale of a car to arrive for this market at \$5.75 to \$6.00 west of Toronto, which is equal to \$6.10 here; the sale has also been reported of a car at \$5.75 laid down here, and we quote jobbing lots at \$6 per 100 lbs. Packers, however, say they cannot cut up hogs at these prices. The weather has been very unfavorable.

DAIRY PRODUCE.

CHEESE.—The general tenor of the market shows signs of improvement, with an increase of orders from the other side for finest goods. Ten and a quarter to 10 3/4 lbs has been paid at Brockville.

BUTTER.—A good steady business has been accomplished for export at firm prices, 23c to 24c having been paid for choice late made creamery, but holders are now asking 25c for October make, and we quote 25c to 24c. Eastern Townships dairy is scarce, especially for fine full ends, and prices may be quoted at 26c to 27c, and the same for good to choice Morrisburg. Western is steady at 16c to 17c, and Kamouraska at 16c to 16c.

THE ENGLISH MARKET keeps very firm with advancing prices, which are, however, considered dangerously high.

COUNTRY PRODUCE.

Eggs.—There has been a fairly good demand for selected fresh stock which has sold at 17c to 18c, with Montreal lined selling at 15c to 16c; country lined stock has sold at 14c to 15c. The export demand keeps up splendidly, further orders having been filled during the past week at an advance of 3d to 6d per long hundred.

GAMES.—Sales of partridge have transpired at 45c to 50c for No. 1, and 25c to 30c for No. 2. Venison saddles are quoted at 10c to 11c and carcasses 5c to 6c.

DRESSED POULTRY.—The few lots arriving have been placed at within the following range:—Turkeys, 9c to 10c; chickens, 5c to 7c; geese, 5c to 6c; and ducks 8c to 9c per lb. It is expected that a good demand will be experienced for the English market.

BEANS.—The market is steady and sales have been made during the week at the following quotations:—Common, \$1.10 to \$1.15; choice, \$1.40 to \$1.55, and hand picked pea beans are quoted at \$1.65 to \$1.75.

HONEY.—The honey market is steady and the demand has been fairly good during the week, sales being quoted as follows: fancy white clover in comb, 11c to 15c; dark, 10c to 12c; extracted, 8c to 10c.

HAY.—The market is fairly active and prices remain unchanged, and we quote \$8 to \$9 for No. 1, \$7.50 to \$8 for No. 2. Pressed hay is steady at \$5.50 to \$9.50; straw at \$4 to \$5. Advances from England state that best qualities of hay are very scarce, and that Canadian hay is likely to be wanted on the other side this winter. Choice hay is selling in Liverpool at £4 15s to £5 per ton of 2240 lbs.

POTATOES.—The market has shown a somewhat steadier tone, the sale of a car load being reported at the close of last week at 45c per bag of 90 lbs, but to-day 50c is the lowest price for car lots of good ordinary stock, 55c having been refused yesterday for two cars of choice Early Rose, so that 50c to 55c is now a fair quotation for good to choice qualities, smaller quantities bringing 60c.

FRUITS, &c.

APPLES.—The market keeps fairly steady; stocks are comparatively light, and all offerings this week were readily disposed of at \$2 to \$2.10 for fair to good winter varieties. Sales were reported of one car load of straight greenings at \$2, 1 car do. at \$2.10, 1 car do. at \$2.15 and a car of very choice red- at \$2.20, but \$2 to \$2.10 is a fair average range. The English market has kept remarkably steady, considering the large quantities that have arrived there of late from this side.

CHICKENS.—A large lot was received during the week, and sales are reported to have been made at 8c to 12c per lb. as to quantity.

LIVE STOCK.

The receipts of live stock at the yards of the Montreal Stock Yards Company, Point St. Charles, for the week ending Nov. 14th, were as follows:—Cattle 1812; sheep 1220; lambs 965; hogs 50. As the export season draws to a close, trade in this class of cattle becomes proportionately dull. Medium receipts, little demand or change of hands. The local trade, with heavy supply of inferior stock, was dull, anything except good heaves selling at almost any price offered. There is no change in the hog market: large receipts; 4c for best values;—We quote the following:—Cattle: export, 4c to 4c; butchers' good, 3 1/2c to 3c; inferior, 2c to 3c; stockers, 2 1/2c to 3c. Sheep, 3c. Lambs, \$3 each. Hogs, 4c to 4c. Calves, \$3 to \$7.

Hog Cholera in Ontario.

Exaggerated statements are being published by certain newspapers relative to the existence of hog cholera in Ontario. The disease is known to have existed in a few places and the Department of Agriculture has been in very active correspondence with Professor Andrew Smith, of Toronto, Provincial Veterinary Inspector of the Department, in relation to the matter. The minister has given Dr. Smith authority to slaughter and quarantine hogs in some cases which he has reported to the department, but the professor also reports that other diseases have been mistaken for hog cholera, and that this has been proved by careful diagnosis. There is no cause for excitement or alarm.
