## The Irish Language

The Society for the Preservation of the lrish Language, says the Freeman does much quiet but earnest work. The Council at its recent meeting learned with considerable satisfaction that the Irish Hierarchy had confirmed the appointment of a Professor of Irish in the College of Maynooth. The bishops have appointed the Rev. Eugene O'Growney, C.C., a member of the Society, to fill the vacant chair. The Council expressed a hope that the Episcopal Committee on Catholic education will soon be enabled to deal in an equally satisfactory manner

with the appointment of a Professor of frish in St. Patrick's Training College, Drumcondra. When this shall have been done, they say, results of far reaching im portance to the Irish language movement must follow. Mr. Michael O'Mally, of Derryneen National School, Galway, has nurnished an admirable report, which contains the following: As I have no doubt you will be glad to hear of any ellorts made towards preserving and ex-tending the Irish language, I beg to say that I attended at the recent examination by the National Board for a certificate of competency to teach the subject. Having succeeded at the examination I shall, as early as possible introduce the teaching of Irish into my school.

#### Hog Cholera in Ontario.

Exaggerated statements are being published by certain newspapers relative to the existence of hog cholera in Ontario. The disease is known to have existed in a few places and the Department of Agriculture has been in very active correspondence with Professor Andrew Smith, of Toronto, Provincial Veterinary Inspector of the Department, in relation to the matter. The minister has given Dr. Smith authority to slaughter and quarantine hogs in some cases which he has reported to the department, but the professor elso reports that other diseases have been mistaken for hog cholera, and that this has been proved by careful diagnosis. There is no cause for excitement or alarm.
