of this, however, cannot be classed with those doubting Thomases. He has brought forth a book of some 676 pages, which represents a grouping of his clinical lectures, with some elaborations. The opening chapters deal chiefly with the methods employed in medical treatment and this part of the work is elaborately illustrated. Of course a good part of the book deals with those conditions requiring the surgeon's knife, but throughout the work operative procedures are kept in the background and only brought into view as a last resort. We believe the work will receive the undoubted endorsation of the general practitioner.

The Works of Voltaire. In our front form pages will be found an advertisement which sets forth pretty completely details with regard to this very fine set of books. On the title page we read—A Contemporary Version—A Critique and Biography, by the Rt. Hon. John Morley—Notes by Tobias Smollett, revised and modernized—New Translations by William F. Fleming and an Introduction by Oliver H. G. Leigh. The work is complete in 43 volumes and will make a very handsome and acceptable addition to all medical libraries in this country. There are all told 168 designs, comprising reproductions of rare old engravings, steel plates, photogravures and curious fac-similies.
