EMPLOYMENT EQUITY ACT

MEASURE TO ENACT

Hon. Flora MacDonald (Minister of Employment and Immigration) moved that Bill C-62, an Act respecting employment equity, be read the third time and passed.

She said: Mr. Speaker, it is with genuine pleasure and, indeed, pride that I stand to move third and final reading of Bill C-62, an Act respecting employment equity. The phrase "employment equity" is new. It has only entered our common vocabulary in the last 18 months with the presentation of the Royal Commission report by Judge Rosalie Abella. However, the issue with which that report and this piece of legislation deals is not new. The barriers to equality in the workplace for too long have hindered women, native people, disabled persons and visible minorities. Indeed, during the 14 years I have been in this House the issue has not been new. It has been raised in questions and in committees throughout the whole of that time. I can say quite frankly that in the years before this Government came to power I heard a lot of talk about fairness and equality but I saw no action. What we are seeing here today is a Government committed to action in this field.

The House is being asked not simply to talk about an issue. The House is being asked to take action. Employment equity is more than just a problem to be solved. It is an essential part of the fabric of our nation. Like bilingualism, multiculturalism
