ESTEY COMMISSION REPORT—INADEQUACIES OF SUPERVISORY STRUCTURE

Mr. Geoff Wilson (Swift Current—Maple Creek): Mr. Speaker, the exhaustive report of Mr. Justice Estey has basically confirmed the conclusions of the Commons Finance Standing Committee which, in May, 1985, examined the Canadian Commercial Bank and noted first: "CCB's accounting practices overstated income and understated loan losses"; second, "it would seem appropriate to raise as a matter of public policy the question of what responsibility the external auditors of financial institutions have vis-à-vis the public at large"; and third, "management accepted risks beyond the realms of prudence—the question then becomes whether supervision in this instance was adequate."

The basic problem is inadequacies in the structure of the supervisory establishment.

Last fall the Finance Committee tabled 134 recommendations concerning financial regulatory reform. Now that the Estey Report is in, it is time for action to update and modernize the regulations governing the financial institutions of our country.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL AFFAIRS**

REINSTATEMENT URGED OF TOXICOLOGY CENTRE PROPOSAL

Hon. Chas. L. Caccia (Davenport): Mr. Speaker, the construction of the toxicology centre, announced in 1983, in response to a request by the Toronto and Guelph Universities, was scrapped in 1984 by the Minister of Finance (Mr. Wilson). Yet warnings about the scale of the toxic chemical problem in the Great Lakes were raised in reports released by the Niagara River Toxics Committee, the International Joint Commission, the Royal Society and the Canadian Environmental Law Research Foundation.

I call on the Government to reinstate the Toronto-Guelph Toxicology Centre to give Canada greater knowledge about the volatization of PCBs, Mirex, benzenes and other highly toxic chemicals discharged into the Great Lakes, and how they are returned through the atmosphere to the soil, considering that their presence has been measured in cattle, milk, and crops. The health implications of this toxic cycle require the research that would be conducted at such a centre.

CANADA-UNITED STATES TRADE NEGOTIATIONS—POSITION OF LIBERAL PARTY
