WATERMELON rind may be made into preserves or sweet pickles that will be enjoyed as a change from the usual same sweet pickles that Now. with regard to your cactus. Do you not think it needs re-potting? Since it has remained in the same vessel for three years perhaps a complete change of soil will help materially. There can be no doubt that the present soil has lost its nourishment. Indeed, it could hardly be otherwise. Such a plant as you mention, "four feet high and not less than three will be enjoyed as a change from the usual sweetmeats when fresh fruits are gone. Make a syrup of a pound of sugar and a pint of water for every pound of rind. Bring this syrup to the boiling point and to it add the juice of a large lemon and a half a teaspoonful of alum. Put in the rind and cook until tender and

clear. Remove the melon and continue cooking the syrup until as thick as wanted. Put the rind in jars and pour the liquid over it.

More lemon juice may be added if a sharp flavor is wanted.

For the pickle make a syrup of a quart of white vinegar and three pounds of sugar. Tie a spoonful of whole cloves and one of allspice and a as large as the present one.
