### HAMILTON BREEDER BUYS THORBREDS

#### S. B. Thomson Returns From England With Young Race Horses.

MONTREAL, Nov. 22.—Strathern B. Thomson of Hamilton, one of the most prominent amateur horsemen in Canada, and an ex-champion welterweight boxer of Canada, arrived on the steamship Montreal from England with seven thoroughbred horses, which he had purchased at the Newmarket October sale. In charge of the horses was Laurence Foster, for seventeen years a successful trainer, to Joseph Cannon, the celebrated English trainer, and rider of the grand national steeplechase on one occasion.  
 "Hounds have been turned into five-shilling pieces, insofar as the value of thoroughbred stock is concerned in England," said Mr. Thomson. "Yearlings that three years ago would bring \$1000 under the hammer were sold for as low as \$250, smart, well grown animals out of mares that have produced winners and by sires whose fees range from one hundred to four hundred guineas."  
 Mr. Thomson's purchases include a grey two-year-old colt by Grey Leg, the first horse as a three-year-old to carry 102 pounds in the City and Suburban and win it. The colt is sixteen hands and has plenty of bone. He was bred by the King's horse, Minoru, and won the Newmarket stakes; a chestnut colt by Marfax, a grandson of Flying Fox, out of Theale by Donovan; a two-year-old by the White Knight, one of England's greatest stayers; a two-year-old gelding by the St. Simon horse, Simon Square; a two-year-old filly by Masserwin; a Steward's cup winner, out of a mare by Melton, the sire of Sysonby; a filly by Rocius, the half broodmare to Rockland, by Lady, out of Sally Wale, the dam of three good winners. There are seven horses the like of which have perhaps never come to Canada, as far as blood lines are concerned. They will be shown at Hamilton immediately.  
 Mr. Thomson made most of the purchases for Lieut.-Gov. Sir John S. Hendrie.
