

VIA-DUCT PLAN HELD UP AGAIN

Continued From Page 1.

The station thru the switching operations, while with the thru track system there would be none of this trouble, and the York-street subway would not interfere with the station traffic in the least. The main, big question is, however, whether it is more complicated, and the passenger service would be less efficient.

"If you put the York-street subway thru, and do the dispensing with the thru tracks, everything will be complicated," he said, "while with the thru track system you will have a fine station as there is in the world."

Mr. Leonard of the C.P.R. was opposed to Mr. Kelly's proposal. He claimed that his company had no opportunity to say to plan the Saturday afternoon. The C.P.R., he said, was in favor of the plan, and he was quite sure that their engineers could devise a plan that would be more acceptable. He believed that the York-street subway idea materialized in this would mean that the C.P.R. freight loads would have to be shifted to this idea, he thought, was absurd.

C. P. R. Objects.

"We cannot agree to the G. T. R. plan," he said, "and we are now asking to prepare our own plans, and submit them for your approval."

Judge Mabee and Corporation Counsel Drayton thought that this was a reasonable request. Neither liked the idea of a further delay, but as Mr. Drayton remarked: "If the Union Station is to be built, the companies must work together. We don't like to waste any more time, but we can't consistently object."

Chairman Mabee thought it was a street and to the east end of the street, and it was, therefore, decided to let the C. P. R. prepare plans. They were allowed till Feb. 8 to complete them, in order to meet local conditions that copies should be submitted to the commission, the city, the board of trade and the G. T. R.

The width of the subway under the viaduct was then up and the commission decided that these should be the full width of the street, unless the board orders them a different width. There will be an 80-foot subway at Yonge and Bay-sts., and all the rest will be 66 feet, except Trinity-st., which will be 30 feet. Front-st. there should be a 30-foot subway.

The question as to whether compensation could be secured for those who held lots to the south of the proposed viaduct, which would be damaged if there should be no access via York-st., was brought up by Eric Armour and G. F. Shepley. Judge Mabee asked the solicitors to prepare a brief statement of their views of the subject. This they promised to do.

G. T. Somers, representing the board of trade, read a memorial asking that, by virtue of their expense in the viaduct scheme, the city's interests be kept in view, and that should another railway desire entrance to the new depot, their application should be considered with a view to the public interest. Chairman Mabee promised that there would be no trouble in this respect.

The commissioners left on the 10.20 C. P. R. train for Ottawa last night.

EGYPT GRABS TERRITORY

CAIRO, Egypt, Dec. 18.—(Can. Press.)—The Egyptian Government is taking possession of the Sollum district of Barca, which forms the eastern district of Tripoli. The Sollum district borders on Egypt and was ceded by Turkey to the Egyptian Government, which will retain possession pending the end of the war, when the definite status of the territory will be determined.

New York's Gas Strike Deferred

NEW YORK, Dec. 18.—A committee of clergymen representing all denominations persuaded the Consolidated Gas Co. employees today not to plunge the city in darkness at Christmas, but to wait until after the holidays at least before taking action on a proposed strike.

THROWN SIXTY FEET BY TRAIN

Old Man Killed at Albany Level Crossing.

Robert Brock, 75 years, a carpenter, was almost instantly killed when he was struck by a C.P.R. engine at the Albany-avenue crossing at 8.15 yesterday morning. He was hurled 60 feet, to be picked up a huddled and bleeding mass. The body was taken to the morgue, where Coroner M. M. Crawford opened an inquest at 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon. It was adjourned till Dec. 28.

NOTED CHINAMAN SLAIN

PEKIN, Dec. 18.—Tuan-Fang, who has just been killed by his soldiers at Tsechow, as reported by missionaries, was one of the most prominent men in China. He occupied high positions as governor of various provinces, and at one time viceroy of Nanking and at Chekiang and Fokien. He visited America in 1906 at the head of a Chinese commission for the study of educational and industrial conditions. Tuan-Fang was a recognized scholar, art critic and collector. While governor of Shensi Province he gathered all the foreigners in his province together and afforded them protection. In September he was instructed to raise the siege of Chengtu, and was reported to have left Hankow with a force of soldiers.

ATTACK ON UNITARIANISM.

CHICAGO, Dec. 18.—(Can. Press.)—"The Methodist Episcopal Church needs to fear to-day the influence of Unitarianism," magnified, advertised and glorified by the Rev. Dr. J. P. Berry of Buffalo, N.Y., before the weekly meeting of the Methodist Episcopal ministers to-day.

The bishop declared that the Methodist Church was at a standstill and asserted that subtle attacks made upon the divinity of Christ and the attack of Unitarianism were the principal factors which menaced the church.

FARMERS WRITE BORDEN.

OTTAWA, Dec. 18.—Premier Borden in receipt of a large number of letters from western farmers, in which attention is called to the fact that Saturday was the first anniversary of the visit to Ottawa of the mammoth delegation of farmers, which made a large number of demands upon the late government.

All the letters contain the hope that as little time as possible will be lost by the government in meeting the requests made by the members of the delegation.

FOSTER'S GOOD RECORD

"Watchdog of the Treasury" is Putting Up Strong Campaign.

Ex-Controller Thomas Foster, who is in the field for the board of control, bases his claims to support upon his lengthy and valuable municipal experience, and upon his general policy of economical but thorough efficient civic administration. Mr. Foster first entered the council in 1891, and since then has sat for 15 years either as alderman or controller. He points out that with the increased assessment of \$53,000,000, yielding a much larger revenue, it should be possible to reduce the tax rate next year, and if elected he will urge this course upon the council. He will also press his project of a civic fruit market, for which he last year secured the endorsement of council.

Other reforms which Mr. Foster urges are the reorganization of the works and waterworks departments under competent heads, and the collection of tax bills by the banks, which would be an immense convenience to citizens. Mr. Foster will hold a series of meetings, which will cover every section of the city. The first will be held to-night at Sumnerfield Hall, corner of Dovercourt-road and Van Horne-street.

THOUSAND HOMES OF DANGER

Dr. Hastings declared yesterday that he believed there were a thousand homes in Toronto which were disseminating the germs of tuberculosis. Those homes, he said, should be under the supervision of the medical health department. To date 675 homes were being visited by nurses, who gave instruction as to the treatment of patients and as to the prevention of the spread of the disease, but he did not think that that number was more than half.
