BEER MAY BE TO BLAME FOR FRENCH TROUBLE

American Beverage is Replacing Wines—Advances in Last Fifteen Years.

NEW YORK, June 28.—The Herald Paris cable says: Perhaps it is beer that has caused the wine trouble in the south, and "force est avec le vin." Perhaps wine in the meridional districts is like corn in Kansas, while the product of the brew continues its invasion.

Beer was once a sort of exception in France. It now relieves the cultivated thirst of half the population of France. Only fifteen years ago in Paris "la biere" was a comparative rarity, measured with the quantity of other refreshments in current use, but to-day half the terrace tables exhibit the various shades of amber reflected by the fermentation which, according to one authority, dates from the days of Oesir.

French and German beers naturally lead in the work of quenching local thirst. English pale ales and stout have established a very progressive school on this side of the channel, but American brewers have also discovered dry spots on the continent and are bidding for custom.

The American flood is yet rather light as compared with the European article, but it is growing. The beer that made Milwaukee famous is provided by Messrs. McKinney & Co., 20 rue des Capucines. Mr. Otis McKinney said yesterday:

"Schlitz does not need an introduction to Americans, but we are engaged in making it known to French customers. People over here at first find American beer rather strange, but this objection soon disappears. Schlitz made Milwaukee famous, and we want it to make us famous too."

Other American cities made famous by the same process are represented in on a hot day the name of Budweiser inspires hope that internal temperature may be rendered cooler.

It has been attended to at Henry's, where the Ambrose Busch St. brand has been well known to the American contingent. The firm of Paul Cuvillier & Co., in the Rue de la Paix, in the French agent for Budweiser. Of course, high grade Americans constitute the main stock of this "chic" grocery, and beer is only a side issue, answering to a certain demand.

"The American beer business is not enormous," remarked Cuvillier yesterday, "but we are filling orders and the custom is likely to increase."

Cuvillier asserted incidentally that the custom supplied by many of the Americans in Paris was queer, to say the least.

"Americans wonder why they are charged higher prices in Paris than in America for American articles," he said. "They are wonderful business men at home, but in Paris they forget all about the French and the Douane charges, the breakage and waste."

Milwaukee's fame is claimed for their beer. How about Pabst? Mr. Burth, proprietor of the latter establishment in the Champs Elysees, supplies the Fast export article. Burth also reports that the expense of the beer trade here in American beer is not gigantic but growing.

"I have a good clientele for Pabst beer," he continued, "and it is growing. Johnny Reiff says he won't have any other, and it does not appear to affect his weight."

At the Grand Cafe, Victor, who pushes glasses in front of him all day, says the statement that beer is crowding out other aperitifs is all "blague." Coffee, he declares, is the winner, and has been for a long time. Of course, he admits beer is popular at the clientele of the bourgeois to a large extent, but has not superseded other beverages in the cafes as much as the laity imagine.

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SPEAKS ON POWER.

Rev. A. B. Simpson Addressed Christian Missionary Alliance.

The Christian and Missionary Alliance convention at Zion Congregational Church last night was addressed by Rev. A. B. Simpson of New York, president of the alliance, on the subject of "Power." With him on the platform was Dr. Henry Wilson, one of the field superintendents.

The meeting was largely attended, church workers of all Protestant denominations being present. Tomorrow the services, morning and afternoon, will be addressed by Drs. Wilson and Simpson, and Sunday afternoon the latter will speak on "Foreign Missions." A children's service, conducted by Dr. Wilson, will be held in Zion Church at 1.30 p.m. tomorrow day.

LIKE PETAWAWA CAMP.

Advance Guard of 9th Field Battery Reach Home.

The 9th Field Battery will arrive today from their two weeks' training at Petawawa Camp.

On Monday the Dominion Day salute will be fired at the old fort. The battery will parade in review order at the armories at 10 o'clock.

Members of the battery are enthusiastic over the new camp, and predict great things for it in the next few years. The water supply is excellent and plentiful. Shower baths are being erected at various points throughout the camp.

It is a remarkably healthy place, as the total absence of sick cases in the hospital shows. The Ottawa River, on which the camp is situated, has a beautiful sandy beach and perfectly safe for bathing. The order of dress for all drills was gray shirts and straw hats, which was a departure from the usual order of things that the men greatly appreciated.

The Royal Canadian Dragoons leave today for Petawawa. The ride will take about three weeks.

C. P. R. EARNINGS.

Net Profits Show Increase Over Last Year.

MONTREAL, Que., June 28.—(Special.)—May, 1907: Gross earnings, \$6,987,185; working expenses, \$4,617,777; net profits, \$2,369,408.

May, 1906: Net profits were \$2,187,683, and for 11 months ending May, 1907, figures are as follows: Gross earnings, \$65,399,815; working expenses, \$42,511,613; net profits, \$22,888,202.

For 11 months ending May 31, 1906, there was a net profit of \$21,032,268.

The increase in net profits over the same period last year is, therefore, for May, \$1,856,000, and for 11 months ended May 31, there was an increase of \$1,856,000.

PLAN IS ABANDONED.

Proposal for Ordnance Factory at Ottawa Stopped.

OTTAWA, June 28.—(Special.)—The proposal which was made to the government some time ago for the establishment in Ottawa of an ordnance factory to supply munitions of war for the Canadian militia, has, it is understood, been abandoned for the present at all events.

Charges of Conspiracy and Forgery. NEW YORK, June 28.—Indictments charging conspiracy and forgery against George R. Scruggs, manager of the International policyholders' committee, and Charles A. Strupp, an employee of the committee, were returned today by the grand jury.

An indictment for conspiracy was also found against James Cunningham, another employee of the committee.
